
Listen to Margareta Osborn, Dorothy Johnston, Paul Mitchell and Scot Gardner read from their latest novels, talk writing and take questions. You can also buy books and have them signed.

Margareta Osborn is a fifth-generation farmer who has lived and worked on the land all her life. She holds a Diploma of Conservation and Land Management and is a past recipient of the prestigious Victorian Rural Women's Leadership Bursary. Home is a beef property overlooking a beautiful lake in the Gippsland high country, where she lives with her husband and three children. Margareta is the author of the No 1 bestsellers Bella's Run and A Bush Christmas, as well as Hope's Road, Mountain Ash, Outback Cowboy and Rose River. Her seventh novel, Lake Hill, was released in May. Margareta's stories are set in the rugged and beautiful Australian bush, and are a wonderful combination of drama, comedy and romance.

The first of **Dorothy Johnston's** seachange mysteries, *Through A Camel's Eye*, was published in April 2016. The second in the series, and Johnston's eleventh novel, is due for publication in September. Johnston has also written a quartet of mysteries set in Canberra. The first of these, *The Trojan Dog*, was joint winner ACT Book of the Year. Two of Johnston's literary novels, *One for the Master* and *Ruth* have been shortlisted for the Miles Franklin award. She has published many short stories and essays in Australia's newspapers and journals and she reviews fiction for Fairfaxmedia.

Paul Mitchell's episodic novel We. Are. Family was published in late 2016 to wide critical acclaim. Three brothers are forced to confront the quiet, pervasive violence of their family's past and the distances they have all carried their father's pain into their futures, and the novel unravels the twisting threads that tie us to the past. The author of four previous books, Paul's 2014 poetry collection Standard Variation was shortlisted for the Adelaide Writers' Week poetry prize, and his first poetry book won a national unpublished manuscript award. Paul is also a widely published essayist and journalist, with work published in The Age, Meanjin, The Big Issue, ABC Religion and Ethics, Griffith Review and Eureka Street.

Scot Gardner became a writer after a chance meeting with a magazine editor while hitchhiking in East Gippsland. Scot's first fiction for young adults, One Dead Seagull, was published after he attended a writing camp with John Marsden. More than a decade later, his many books have found local and international favour and garnered praise and awards for their honest take on adolescent life. They include books like White Ute Dreaming, Burning Eddy and most recently Happy as Larry, winner of a WA Premier's Book Award for young adult fiction, and The Dead I Know. winner of the CBCA Book of the Year Award for Older Readers. Scot lives with his wife and some chickens in Yinnar South.
