Aisha Alim is an empowerment coach, speaker, consultant, mentor, facilitator and now a published author. She is a mother and a former primary school teacher with a Diploma and Bachelor's degree. In 2017 she turned her attention specifically to life coaching and facilitating adult workshops, with a passion in helping people find their purpose, overcome fear and developing confidence. She takes a very balanced view of things and believes true authenticity comes from experience and a willingness to learn.



Alanah Andrews is a high school English teacher and writer of speculative fiction. She has won several awards including the Birdcatcher Books Short Story Award and the Avid Readers Flash Fiction Prize. Alanah has published a post-apocalyptic novella Exiles, and currently has two books in her YA dystopian Eridu series which explores a near-future world where emotions have been forbidden.



Karen Casey is a journalist and author from regional Victoria. She worked for newspapers around Australia and in Northern Ireland, freelanced for lifestyle and industry magazines and wrote and studied fiction every moment in between. Karen's first adult fiction manuscript was longlisted for an Australian Vogel Literary Award. She has since published a children's book, The Extraordinary, Unordinary Gum Tree, which raises money for Australian farmers facing hardship. The second book in the series is called The Extraordinary Tom Fink and was published in late 2019. In the adult literary world, Karen has released The Misadventures of the Travelling Quirkus, a humorous memoir about a chaotic outback road trip with her family.



Sarah Jane Duncan is a dark romance author, with her debut, the Heavy Hearts Series. Sarah lives in the beautiful Gippsland region in Victoria, Australia, with her high-school-sweetheart-turned-hubby and three grown children. She has a very close relationship with her young adult children, who are more like her best friends. When she's not busy writing, Sarah can be found sewing dance costumes for her daughter or helping her hubby in their family business. Sarah writes about females who have to fight against the odds to find their power, find their voice, and find their truth. The heroines in Sarah's stories possess the strength that only comes when you have to fight for your lifelexperience and a willingness to learn.

Through sharing her own story of having dyslexia, Megan hopes to inspire children to read, and to create their own stories, even if for some it is difficult.
