BACKGROUND

Since 2000, Latrobe City has facilitated an International Relations Advisory Committee made up of Councillors, Council staff, key stakeholders and other interested members of the community.

The general purpose of the committee is to provide advice to Council on matters related to the external aspects of International Relations, specifically to promote economic and cultural development; to support Councils initiatives in respect to International Relations across the broader community; and to liaise where relevant with other Council committees on internal aspects of international relations such as Cultural and Linguistic Diversity (CALD) and Refugee Resettlement.

As outlined in detail in the attached Terms of Reference, Committee members are expected to contribute their expertise and advice in achieving the objectives and deliverables of the Latrobe City International Relations Plan 2011-2014. These include;

3.1. To support a range of economic, cultural, sporting, educational, youth and exchange opportunities;

3.2. To promote, through sister city and other international relationships, greater understanding and friendship between Latrobe City and the participating cities and, in doing so, contribute to the mutual welfare of all the communities involved;

3.3. To advise Council of new international relationship opportunities;

3.4. To extend community participation and involvement in various aspects of the Australian and Latrobe City sister city programs by promoting the concept of the program throughout the municipality;

3.5. In conjunction with the Council, the Committee is to act as an advocate, sounding board and channel of communication for the community and other stakeholders in managing international relationships;

3.6. To involve members of international communities in international relations meetings to foster knowledge, understanding and co-operation;

3.7. To undertake any other activity within these terms of reference that may be conducive to the further development of the Latrobe City International Relations Committee;

3.8. To report to Council annually on the overall operations and achievements of the International Relations program.

- 5. That the Latrobe City International Relations Committee undertakes a review of the Terms of Reference within six months of appointment and provides a report to Council on the findings.

6. That Council writes to those people who expressed an interest in membership of the Latrobe City International Relations Committee to advise them of the outcome and thank them for their interest.

Immediately following caretaker and the appointment of new Councillor representatives to the Latrobe City International Relations Advisory Committee, a sub-committee with Councillor representation was formed to review the current Terms of Reference of the committee. Members on the sub-committee included Cr Gibbons, Les Hunt, John Guy OAM, Lorraine Bartling OAM, Graham Goulding and Paul Taylor. The key changes to the revised Terms of Reference are;

- Inclusion of an annual report to Council.
- Greater emphasis on liaising with other council committees that focus on 'internal aspects' of international relations, namely the Cultural and Linguistic Diversity Committee and the Settlement Committee.

At its meeting of 13 March 2013 the Latrobe City International Relations Advisory Committee unanimously endorsed the attached amended Terms of Reference and now present them to Council for consideration.

For the purpose of the draft agenda, the current Terms of Reference are included as an attachment for comparison purposes, but will be deleted from the final agenda that is released to the public.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

INTERNAL/EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

CONCLUSION

Latrobe City facilitates an International Relations Advisory Committee. The committee oversees the implementation of the Latrobe City International Relations Plan 2011-2014 and provides feedback and guidance to Council relative to the pursuit of the sister city relations which Latrobe City maintains with Taizhou in China and Takasago in Japan.

The committee now submit revised Terms of Reference for consideration of Council.

International Relations Committee

Terms of Reference – 6 May 2013

1. INTRODUCTION

Latrobe City is committed to an International Relations Strategy as part of the City's ongoing economic and cultural development. Within the municipality we have communities and enterprises with international links which should be expanded, valued and supported.

Formal international relationships between cities have the potential to promote mutual understanding and are a powerful force for the development of peace, goodwill and friendship between all nations.

Community understanding and support is critical to the success of an International Relations Program. To assist with this objective Latrobe City Council has established an International Relations Committee.

2. THE PURPOSE

2.1. To provide advice to Council on matters related to the external aspects of International Relations, specifically to promote economic and cultural development;

2.2. To support Councils initiatives in respect to International Relations across the broader community;

2.3. Liaise where relevant with other Council committees on internal aspects of international relations such as Cultural and Linguistic Diversity (CALD) and Resettlement.

3. ROLE OF THE LATROBE CITY INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

Committee members are expected to contribute their expertise and advice in achieving the objectives and deliverables of the Latrobe City International Relations Plan 2011-2014. These include;

3.1. To support a range of economic, cultural, sporting, educational, youth and exchange opportunities;

- 3.2. To promote, through sister city and other international relationships, greater understanding and friendship between Latrobe City and the participating cities and, in doing so, contribute to the mutual welfare of all the communities involved;
- 3.3. To advise Council of new international relationship opportunities;
- 3.4. To extend community participation and involvement in various aspects of the Australian and Latrobe City sister city programs by promoting the concept of the program throughout the municipality;
- 3.5. In conjunction with the Council, the Committee is to act as an advocate, sounding board and channel of communication for the community and other stakeholders in managing international relationships;
- 3.6. To involve members of international communities in international relations meetings to foster knowledge, understanding and co-operation;
- 3.7. To undertake any other activity within these terms of reference that may be conducive to the further development of the Latrobe City International Relations Committee;
- 3.8. To report to Council annually on the overall operations and achievements of the International Relations program.

4. LATROBE CITY COUNCIL PLAN 2012-2016

The Council Plan is built around the nine objectives contained in Latrobe 2026, Economy, Natural Environment, Built Environment, Our Community, Cultural, Recreation, Governance, Advocacy and Partnerships and Regulation and Accountability.

The Council Plan outlines the strategic direction of Latrobe City Council in each objective, supported by major initiatives and service delivery to be implemented during the four years of the plan. Objectives directly related to International Relations include:

Strategic Direction – Culture

Facilitate and support events, community festivals and arts programs that reflect and celebrate cultural diversity and heritage.

Increase the accessibility of Latrobe City Council's cultural facilities, programs and events.

Foster greater awareness, understanding and respect for other cultures through the promotion of international relationships.

Service Provision – Culture

Deliver International Relations programs and services in accordance with the Latrobe City Council International Relations Plan

Service Provision – Economy

In conjunction with the Victorian and Federal Governments, facilitate the attraction of large investments to Latrobe City for the creation of sustainable jobs.

5. MEMBERSHIP

- 5.1. The Latrobe City International Relations Committee will comprise a maximum of twenty-one (21) participants.
 - Three (3) nominated Councillors
 - Manager Cultural Liveability
 - Coordinator Events and International Relations
 - International Relations Officer
 - Up to nine (9) community representatives appointed by Council
 - Individuals may be co-opted to represent key stakeholders at specific meetings.
- 5.2. Community representatives shall be appointed to represent the broad interests of the community.
- 5.3. Membership will be selected through an Expression of Interest process. Expressions of interest will be sought by Council from community members. Upon receipt of these Expressions of Interests, the nominated Councillors in association with Council officers will evaluate all applications and put forward a recommended Committee for Council endorsement.
- 5.4. Council will nominate three Councillors to sit on the Committee a Councillor will be required to chair the Committee at its bimonthly meetings.
- 5.5. Members will be appointed for a two year term from the date of adoption. Members may reapply for appointment at the conclusion of a two-year term. In the case of casual vacancies, members shall be appointed for a period as determined by Latrobe City Council, with advice from the Committee.
- 5.6. Any member may resign at any time by advising of their resignation to the Committee in writing, and Latrobe City Council, with advice from the Committee, may appoint any person to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term of the member who resigned.

6. MEETINGS

- 6.1. The International Relations Committee will set its own agenda and meeting times.
- 6.2. It is expected however that the committee will meet at least every 2 months. The meetings will be held at Latrobe City Council Headquarters, Commercial Road in Morwell, unless otherwise decided by the Committee.
- 6.3. Meetings will begin at 5.30 pm and the duration of each meeting should generally not exceed two hours.
- 6.4. Written notice of each committee meeting shall be provided to all committee members at least two weeks before the date of the scheduled meeting.
- 6.5. The Committee members are required to notify of their attendance or absence to the Latrobe City's International Relations Officer at least one week before the date of the scheduled meeting.
- 6.6. Meetings will follow standard meeting procedures.
- 6.7. All meetings of the Latrobe City International Relations Committee are open to members of the public. The Chair has full discretion to close the meeting to the public at any time in order to consider any item of business. Members of the public in attendance at the time the Chair designates the meeting as closed to the public will be required to leave the meeting immediately.

7. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

- 7.1. Administrative support shall be the responsibility of the Latrobe City's International Relations Officer.
- 7.2. This support will include keeping minutes, notification of meeting dates and preparation of correspondence as deemed relevant and appropriate.

8. AUTHORITY AND REPORTING

- 8.1. The Committee is an advisory committee only and has no delegated decision making authority.
- 8.2. Reports to the Latrobe City Council will be co-ordinated through the General Manager Recreation Culture and Community Infrastructure.

- 8.3. The Committee shall report on its activities on an annual basis and this report will form part of the official Council agenda. The Committee shall determine the form and content of its report with the advice of Latrobe City Council. Latrobe City Council shall provide administrative assistance in the preparation and production of the report.
- 8.4. With the approval of the Chair the Committee may provide formal reports or letters to Latrobe City Council. This correspondence will be received by Council through an ordinary Council Meeting in 'Correspondence'.

9. FILLING OF VACANCIES

Following the initial appointments of Latrobe City International Relations Committee members, filling of vacancies that may occur from time to time will be subject to approval of Council.

10. TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

A committee member who is absent from three consecutive meetings without leave having been granted shall automatically forfeit membership and Latrobe City Council, with advice from the Committee, may appoint any person to fill the consequent vacancy. ATTACHMENT 2



International Relations Committee

Terms of Reference – 6 February 2012

1. INTRODUCTION

Through the implementation of the Latrobe City International Relations Plan 2011-2014, Latrobe City supports the establishment of formal relationships between cities throughout the world under the auspices of the sister cities movement. Latrobe City is a member of Sister Cities Australia and endorses its aims and objectives.

Formal relationships between cities have the potential to promote mutual understanding and are a powerful force for the development of peace, goodwill and friendship between all nations.

2. THE PURPOSE AND ROLE OF THE LATROBE CITY INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The purpose of the committee will be to promote and foster friendship, communication, understanding and economic development initiatives between the residents of Latrobe City and those of other nations through the establishment and management of sister city and other international relationships.

It is envisaged that the committee will achieve this purpose by adopting, and operating in accordance with the following objectives:

- To broaden the range of existing cultural, sporting, educational, youth and economic exchange opportunities and to establish a lasting, sustainable and friendly relationship with Latrobe's sister cities, Taizhou City, China and Takasago City, Japan;
- To promote, through sister city and other international relationships, greater understanding and friendship between Latrobe City residents and the participating cities and, in doing so, contribute to the mutual welfare of all the communities involved;
- To foster the involvement of community groups and organisations in various aspects of international relationships, with particular focus on those sectors of our community that concentrate on the growth of our youth;
- To advise Council on issues of importance to the overall program and to provide ideas for extending affiliations and developing new international relationships;



- To extend community participation and involvement in various aspects of the Australian and Latrobe City sister city program by promoting the concept of the program throughout the municipality;
- To undertake any other activity within these terms of reference that may be conducive to the further development of the Latrobe City International Relations Committee;
- To assist Latrobe City Council in its economic development pursuits by leveraging the network of international relationships;

3. RELATIONSHIP TO LATROBE 2026

Latrobe 2026 is the community's vision for the future development of the region builds on its strength as one of Victoria's key regional economies and its position as the commercial centre of Gippsland with a focus on education, health and community services and facilities.

Other major aspirations are for a community that is both liveable and sustainable, with a continued focus on healthy lifestyles supported by high quality recreational and cultural facilities and a natural environment that is nurtured and respected.

The community has expressed its desire for a future in which people are united in a common purpose whilst respecting the diversity of their heritage and cultures. To enable the vision to become reality the community identified the need for effective and proactive leadership at all levels and expressed a willingness to connect with community leaders to enrich local decision making.

Latrobe 2026: The Community Vision for Latrobe Valley:

"'In 2026 the Latrobe Valley is a liveable and sustainable region with collaborative and inclusive community leadership."

4. LATROBE CITY COUNCIL PLAN 2011-2015

Facilitate the attraction of large investments to Latrobe City in conjunction with the Victorian and Australian Governments.

5. MEMBERSHIP

- 5.1. The Latrobe City International Relations Committee will comprise a maximum of twenty-one (21) participants.
 - The Mayor and up to two other nominated Councillors.
 - Manager Cultural Liveability.
 - Coordinator Events and International Relations.
 - International Relations Officer.
 - Up to nine (9) community representatives appointed by Council.
 - Up to six (6) members may be co-opted or nominated to represent key stakeholders.
- 5.2. Community representatives shall be appointed to represent the broad interests of the community.
- 5.3. Membership will be selected through an Expression of Interest process. Expressions of interest will be sought by Council from community members. Upon receipt of these Expressions of Interests, the nominated Councillors in association with Council officers will evaluate all applications and put forward a recommended Committee for Council endorsement.
- 5.4. In addition to the Mayor, Council will nominate two Councilors' to sit on the Committee the Mayor will be required to chair the Committee at its bimonthly meetings.
- 5.5. Members will be appointed for a two year term from the date of adoption. Members may reapply for appointment at the conclusion of a two-year term. In the case of casual vacancies, members shall be appointed for a period as determined by Latrobe City Council, with advice from the Committee.



5.6. Any member may resign at any time by advising of their resignation to the Committee in writing, and Latrobe City Council, with advice from the Committee, may appoint any person to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term of the member who resigned.

6. MEETINGS

- 6.1. The International relations Committee will set its own agenda and meeting times.
- 6.2. It is expected however that the committee will meet at least every 2 months. The meetings will be held at Latrobe City Council Headquarters, Commercial Road in Morwell.
- 6.3. Meetings will begin at 5.30pm and the duration of each meeting should generally not exceed two hours.
- 6.4. Written notice of each committee meeting shall be provided to all committee members at least two weeks before the date of the scheduled meeting.
- 6.5. The Committee members are required to notify of their attendance or absence to the Latrobe City's International Relations Officer at least one week before the date of the scheduled meeting.
- 6.6. Meetings will follow standard meeting procedures.
- 6.7. All meetings of the Latrobe City International Relations Committee are open to members of the public. The Chair has full discretion to close the meeting to the public at any time in order to consider any item of business. Members of the public in attendance at the time the Chair designates the meeting as closed to the public will be required to leave the meeting immediately.

7. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

- 7.1. Administrative support shall be the responsibility of the Latrobe City's International Relations Officer.
- 7.2. This support will include keeping minutes, notification of meeting dates and preparation of correspondence as deemed relevant and appropriate.



8. FILLING OF VACANCIES

Following the initial appointments of Latrobe City International Relations Committee members, filling of vacancies that may occur from time to time will be subject to approval of Council.

9. TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

A committee member who is absent from three consecutive meetings without leave having been granted shall automatically forfeit membership and Latrobe City Council, with advice from the Committee, may appoint any person to fill the consequent vacancy.

9.2 PETITION - REQUEST TO BUILD A ROUNDABOUT AT THE INTERSECTION OF MARKET STREET AND ALBERT STREET, MOE

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to present Council with further information on treatment options for the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street, Moe, as a result of a petition requesting a roundabout be built at the intersection.

DECLARATION OF INTEREST

No officer declared an interest under the Local Government Act 1989 in the preparation of this report.

STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK

This report is consistent with Latrobe 2026: The Community Vision for Latrobe Valley and the Latrobe City Council Plan 2012-2016.

Latrobe 2026: The Community Vision for Latrobe Valley

Strategic Objectives – Built Environment

In 2026 Latrobe Valley benefits from a well planned built environment that is complementary to its surroundings, and which provides for a connected and inclusive commuity.

Latrobe City Council Plan 2012 - 2016

Shaping Our Future

Strategic Direction – Built Environment

Ensure public infrastructure is maintained in accordance with community aspirations

Service Provision – Infrastructure Development

Provide Asset Management planning, advice and services for Latrobe City

BACKGROUND

Market Street south of Albert Street was converted from one-way traffic flow to two-way traffic flow in early 2011, as part of Stage 1 of the Clifton Street Precinct Upgrade.

Following this, a petition containing 282 signatures (Attachment 1) was presented to Council on 14 October 2011, which sought the construction of a roundabout to address safety concerns at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street. The concerns primarily involved the right-turn exit of Market Street, as well as the amenity of the intersection.

An update report was presented to Council at its Ordinary Meeting on 18 June 2012, and Council resolved:

- 1. That Council notes this report
- 2. That a further report on the request for a roundabout at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street, Moe, be presented to the Ordinary Council meeting in February 2013
- 3. That the head petitioner be advised of Council's decision in relation to the petition requesting a roundabout at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street, Moe.

At the Ordinary Council meeting on 18 February 2013, it was resolved:

1. That Council defer this matter to enable further information to be sought.

ISSUES

The original petition states that now Market Street in Moe has been opened to two-way traffic, there have been numerous accidents at the intersection. There are concerns for the safety of local retailers and their customers, and the petitioners believe that a roundabout would make it safer for pedestrians and motorists, as well as improving visual amenity.

Clifton Street Precinct Upgrade

The Clifton Street Precinct Upgrade, which abuts this intersection, has four stages of construction. Stages 1 and 2 have been completed, while stages 3 and 4 are on hold. Stage 3 is on hold due to a land acquisition, and stage 4 is on hold pending the outcome of this petition as it may have redesign implications. The design for the Clifton Street Precinct Upgrade is included as Attachment 2.

Changes at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street occurred under stage 1 in early 2011, which converted Market Street south of Albert Street from one-way to two-way traffic flow.

In 2008, the consulting traffic engineers for the Clifton Street Precinct Upgrade completed a Signalised & un-signalised Intersection Design & Research Aid (SIDRA) analysis at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street. The analysis report noted "that the provision of a roundabout at the Market Street and Albert Street intersection would offer minimal traffic capacity improvements".

To explore the impacts of placing a roundabout at this intersection, a draft concept plan was developed, and is included as Attachment 3.

Traffic and Pedestrian Usage in the Area

Traffic surveys were taken at the site between 17 July and 31 July, 2012. A summary of the traffic in the intersection is included as Attachment 4. On Albert Street, a total of 4,156 vehicles per day (VPD) approach the intersection from the east, with 2,846 VPD approaching from the west. On Market Street, 586 VPD approach the intersection from the south, with 344 VPD approaching from the north.

In all, approximately 15% of the total traffic within the intersection is from Market Street. Roundabouts work best where the traffic is relatively similar between all legs of the intersection.

Pedestrian counts have not been completed as part of this investigation. However, the northern footpath west of Market Street allows access to the main bus interchange as well as K-Mart, KFC and Coles supermarket. There is an existing pedestrian refuge east of the intersection on Albert Street.

Casualty Accident History

VicRoads CrashStats statistics, which records casualty accidents (accidents that result in fatality or injury), shows that over the last five year period between 2006 and 2011 there were no casualty accidents recorded at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street.

Based on the above information, the recommendation at the Ordinary Council meeting on 18 February 2013 was to not build a roundabout at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street.

Since this Ordinary Council meeting, concerns regarding the intersection have primarily centred on the speeds of vehicles approaching the intersection, and pedestrian access and safety at the intersection.

Vehicle Speeds

The results from the traffic survey in 2012 show that between 9 am and 5 pm, when pedestrian activity is at its highest, the 85th percentile speed of traffic approaching the intersection from the east was 41.52 km/h, with an overall average speed of 33.52 km/h. From the west, the 85th percentile approach speed was 44.52 km/h, with an overall average of 35.62 km/h. These results indicate there is no significant issue with the approach speed of vehicles at the intersection, meaning no treatment is needed to control speeds.

Pedestrian Access and Safety

In terms of pedestrians, there is an existing pedestrian refuge on Albert Street east of the intersection. There is currently no pedestrian refuge for crossing Market Street. The provision for a roundabout would allow for a pedestrian refuge to be incorporated into Market Street. However, traffic volumes on Market Street north of the intersection indicate an AM peak of 94 vehicles per hour, and a PM peak of 125 vehicles per hour. Therefore based on these volumes as well as crash statistics, a pedestrian refuge may not be required.

In addition, a roundabout would not increase the provision for pedestrians at the intersection along Albert Street as it would still result in a pedestrian refuge as is there currently. Furthermore, Austroads Road Design Guidelines indicate that children and elderly pedestrians feel less safe at roundabouts as roundabouts do not give priority to pedestrians. However, there are no studies that show that roundabouts are less safe for pedestrians.

Finally, a Department of Sustainability and Environment report *Safer Design Guidelines for Victoria*, states that "Roundabouts present specific problems for ease of pedestrian movement. Designed to ease vehicle traffic flow, they can feed a flow of gap-free traffic 'downwind' of the roundabout, which reduces the ability for safe, informal street crossings by pedestrians".

Other Options

As part of this report, other treatment options were considered for this intersection, such as a rubber roundabout, pedestrian facilities, and other delineation options.

A rubber roundabout uses rubber segments to build the central island of the roundabout. The segments are bolted into the existing road surface, meaning installation can be completed in days, and reconstruction of the road pavement is avoided.

Problems with rubber roundabouts can exist when larger vehicles negotiate them. The twisting movement of the tyre going around it can pull at the rubber segments and ultimately damage them.

The possibility of a rubber roundabout has been assessed, with a 6 metre diameter central island estimated to cost between \$10,000 and \$12,000. However, this provision would still require substantial permanent works at the approaches to, and outside of, the intersection. The total cost of this option is estimated to be between \$100,000 to \$150,000.

Similarly, the use of rubber segments to form a pedestrian refuge in Market Street north of the intersection has been assessed, with cost estimates included in the section below.

Lastly, the use of rubber splitter islands and lane markers has been assessed. Photos of these treatments are attached, as is a diagram of their possible location, and these could be used in conjunction with line marking to delineate the intersection. Cost estimates of this treatment are included below.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

The following cost estimates of possible treatments have been determined from concept designs, and would require detailed design for more accurate costing.

	Treatment Option	Estimated Cost
1	Permanent Roundabout Construction	\$300 - 500,000
2	Temporary (Rubber) Roundabout Construction	\$100 – 150,000
3	Line marking	\$5000
4	Rubber Segmented Pedestrian Refuge in Market St	\$3 -5,000
5	Line marking, rubber splitter islands and lane markers	\$10-15,000

Examples of the line marking, splitter island and lane marker locations are included as attachments.

Options 1 and 2 in the above table could not be accommodated within current budgets and would need to be referred to a future capital works budget process. Options 3 to 5 could be accommodated within the current road maintenance budget.

INTERNAL/EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

Engagement Method Used:

There has been no specific community consultation undertaken in the preparation of this report

External Consultation:

Latrobe City Council officers have previously met with the head petitioner to discuss the findings of the traffic data, reported casualty accident statistics, and various traffic strategy options, including enhanced line marking

OPTIONS

Council has the following options available in relation to the petition

- 1. Install a permanent roundabout at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street, Moe;
- 2. Install a rubber roundabout at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street, Moe;
- 3. Undertake line marking at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street, Moe.
- 4. Install a rubber-segmented pedestrian refuge on Market Street north of the intersection with Albert Street;
- 5. Undertake line marking and install rubber splitter islands and lane markers at the intersection of Albert Street and Market Street, Moe;

CONCLUSION

Based on the traffic volumes at the intersection, the accident history, and the 2008 SIDRA analysis, the provision for a roundabout would not greatly increase the safety and operation of this intersection. Furthermore, based on traffic speeds, there is no requirement for a roundabout to calm and limit approach speeds to this intersection.

The use of a pedestrian refuge in Market Street may assist pedestrians to cross Market Street, but the level of vehicles using Market Street means this is not required. Additionally, a pedestrian refuge here will have no impact on right turning vehicles exiting Market Street, which was a concern in the original petition.

Line marking with the use of rubber splitter islands and lane markers can be incorporated into the intersection to better delineate it.

A permanent roundabout, in regards to urban amenity, may be a suitable option in any future works for this purpose, but is not required for traffic safety.

The purpose of this report is to present a motion passed by the Latrobe City International Relations Advisory Committee in respect to the invitation to attend the official opening of the Australian Garden in Taizhou, China.

DECLARATION OF INTEREST

No officer declared an interest under the Local Government Act 1989 in the preparation of this report.

OFFICER COMMENTS

At the Ordinary Council Meeting on 4 February 2013, Council considered a request to attend the Australian Garden Opening at the conclusion of the India Trade Mission in late March 2013. Council resolved;

1. That Council approve a delegation consisting of the General Manager and/or Manager of Economic Sustainability to the super trade mission to India

2. That no councillor or officer travel to China.

3. That following the super trade Mission to India , a report outlining the key outcomes and opportunities resulting from the mission be presented to council for consideration within 30 days of returning from the mission.

Immediately following the 4 February 2013 meeting a Notice of Rescission was submitted. The above resolution was therefore considered again at 18 February 2013 Ordinary Council Meeting and was reaffirmed by Council.

Following the decision of Council on 18 Feb 2013, Latrobe City officers advised the Foreign Affairs Office in Taizhou on 25 February 2013 that Latrobe City's attendance at a proposed opening at the conclusion of the Super Trade Mission could not be accommodated.

At its meeting held 13 March 2013 the Latrobe City International Relations Advisory Committee passed the following motion;

The International Relations Committee strongly recommends that Latrobe City seriously consider sending or assisting to send, appropriate representation to the opening of the Australian Garden in our Sister City, Taizhou China, in accordance with the invitation from the Mayor of Taizhou and advise Taizhou accordingly. This motion stems from concern of the Latrobe City International Relations Advisory Committee that although the request to attend an opening in April was not endorsed by Council, the issue of attending an opening some time in the future has not been addressed by Council.

The Australian Garden project was a joint project between Latrobe City and the City of Taizhou, commemorating the 10 year anniversary of the sister city relationship and is considered a significant demonstration of both parties commitment to this global partnership.

The committee provides this advice to Council as per the adopted Terms of Reference;

Latrobe City International Relations Advisory Committee purpose and role will be to promote and foster friendship, communication, understanding and economic development initiatives between the residents of Latrobe City and those of other nations through the establishment and management of sister city and other international relationships.

It is envisaged that the committee will achieve this purpose by adopting, and operating in accordance with the following objectives:

- To broaden the range of existing cultural, sporting, educational, youth and economic exchange opportunities and to establish a lasting, sustainable and friendly relationship with Latrobe's sister cities, Taizhou City, China and Takasago City, Japan;

- To assist Latrobe City Council in its economic development pursuits by leveraging the network of international relationships.

Memorandum of Understanding

This document represents an agreement between the following cities:

- City of Ballarat
- City of Greater Bendigo
- City of Greater Geelong
- Rural City of Horsham
- City of Latrobe
- Rural City of Mildura
- City of Greater Shepparton
- Rural City of Wangaratta
- City of Warmambool
- City of Wodonga

Description of collaborating organisations

Regional Cities Victoria (RCV) is an alliance of 10 regional Victorian cities that represent the collective interest of the regions.

RCV members work co-operatively on issues and projects of mutual interest that affect Regional Cities as well as the whole state of Victoria.

Intention

This Memorandum of Understanding in not legally binding.

Purpose

RCV's vision is to build a sustainable Victoria through regional growth.

Objectives

- Define and develop long-term policies that support and encourage the growth of regional Victoria as a viable alternative to metropolitan Melbourne
- Encourage, enable and support governments to deliver those policies
- Ensure regional cities continue to enjoy quality services, amenities and transport networks
- · Increase workforce capacity and employment opportunities in regional cities

Regional Cities Victoria Memorandum of Understanding 2013

Continue to build awareness of RCV among government, media, business and RCV communities.

Membership

Membership of RCV is by invitation only.

Municipalities seeking to join must submit an application in writing. Membership will only be granted after unanimous approval of the RCV group. RCV members seeking to leave the group will need to advise RCV in writing and will be required to give 12 months' notice.

Scope and operation

RCV will be run on general consensus, however if any issues require a count of votes then the voting rights shall be one vote per member Council.

RCV will be governed by an unincorporated arrangement, as described in this MOU.

The member Councils will be represented by the Mayor and the Chief Executive Officer. Member Council's may nominate alternative delegates only when the Mayor or Chief Executive Officer are absent on approved leave e.g. when an Acting Chief Executive Officer has been appointed by Council.

Terms of the agreement

This agreement will take affect for a period of five years commencing July 1, 2013.

Governance arrangements

The meeting schedule for RCV shall be established in December of the year preceding. Dates will be recommended by the Secreatariat and circulated to members for approval.

The position of Chair and Deputy Chair will be subject to election in December of each year.

RCV's daily operations will be managed by an Executive Management Group (EMG) consisting of:

- RCV Chair
- RCV Deputy Chair
- CEO of Chair's Council
- CEO of Deputy Chair's Council

The EMG has delegated authority to:

- Approve expenditure of up to \$10,000 on individual items/projects in accordance with the approved RCV Strategic Plan.
- · Approve written correspondence on behalf of RCV
- Approve media statements on behalf of the group
- · Nominate RCV members to attend delegations and political briefings

Regional Cities Victoria Memorandum of Understanding 2013

 Instruct the RCV secretariat to perform tasks in accordance with the approved RCV Strategic Plan.

The EMG will hold fortnightly or as necessary work-in-progress meetings with the secretariat.

The secretariat will work to an approved RCV Strategic Plan.

Roles and responsibilities

RCV will be run by a third party secretariat as set out in Schedule 1 to this MOU.

Should external consultants be required to undertake work on behalf of or for RCV, the secretariat will be responsible for the engagement of the consultant. The secretariat will ensure that all procurement/engagement processes are carried out in accordance with statutory requirements e.g. Local Government Act.

RCV will be responsible for the appointment of consultants.

Financial arrangements

The amount to be contributed by RCV members will be determined annually following the development and approval by the members of an annual budget. Contributions will be paid monthly.

Approval of major items of expenditure will be subject to agreement of the members.

Should additional expenditure above the approved annual budget be required, approval will be required from a majority of RCV members in accordance with the "Scope and operation" clause above.

Administrative arrangements

In accordance with the "Roles and responsibilities" clause above RCV will appoint a secretariat to undertake operational functions of the group. Specific details are included in Schedule 1.

It will be the responsibility of the secretariat to ensure that appropriate financial reports are presented to all RCV meetings.

Communication and information management

The secretariat is responsible for preparation of communications and advocacy documents required by RCV.

All external documents will need approval from either the RCV Chair or the EMG before public release.

Ownership of communications and research materials resides with RCV.

Review and evaluation

RCV's strategic plan will be reviewed annually in February.


RCV's achievements will be measured by:

- Assist with the implementation of the policy positions and advocate RCV's position to Government
- Strategic counsel
- Attend inter-departmental or departmental working groups as directed by RCV.



Introduction

Since its formation in 2000, Regional Cities Victoria (RCV) has built a reputation as a credible and effective advocate for its communities and regional Victoria as a whole.

RCV can justifiably take credit for influencing State Government policy, such as the establishment of the Regional Growth Fund, support for and work on delivering the Regional Cities Growth Strategy (RCGS) and the creation of the Regional Cities Ministerial portfolio.

At the same time, RCV has raised awareness of the potential for regional Victoria to provide a solution to Victoria's population growth challenges.

Building on this work, RCV is now aiming to enhance its position as the thought leader in regional development both through continued highquality policy work, a focussed and strategically-planned advocacy program, supported by a proactive communications strategy and a more stringent governance structure.

This strategic plan has been framed in consultation with RCV members and stakeholders for implementation from 2013 to 2014. An immediate priority is to ensure that active projects, such as the RCGS and Financing for Growth are completed, positioning them for additional budget commitments in 2013/14. The plan also builds on other RCV policy development initiatives under way and seeks to further position RCV as the body that will influence long-term policies that will make a positive impact on RCV communities as well as the whole state of Victoria.

Additional work will be undertaken in 2013 to extend this plan's timeframe. While RCV needs a plan for "now", it also needs to develop an additional strategic framework for the longer term.

This strategic plan starts the process of developing a structured and planned way forward. RVC will always be nimble and take advantage of all opportunities for input and advocacy as they arise.



Vision – TBC

Audiences

Political

RCV has windows of opportunity to advocate at a State level in the leadup to the 2014 election and to continue to educate the Federal Government and the Opposition.

This is particularly relevant now that the Federal election is on peoples' minds and when opportunities for advocacy and for policy commitments

are ever-present. For both State and Federal Governments, RCV will argue that the strong population growth in RCV areas justifies long-term investment in physical, social and community infrastructure and services.

RCV will continue to engage with all sides of politics, as well as increasing its Federal Government advocacy activities, based on credible and factual policy positions and submissions to committees addressing issues relevant to RCV.

Where appropriate, RCV will respond to the initiates of governments. In addition, it will lead the way in developing governments' understanding of regional issues, blockages and opportunities.

State Government

A key aim is to strengthen the relationship with the Minister for Regional Cities as well as providing the Minister with policy arguments and funding requests that, in his words, "will make a difference" for regional Victoria and the state as whole.

The Minister has indicated his willingness to advocate for RCV with his Cabinet colleagues and their departments. A key focus therefore is to equip him to do so effectively.

To maximise the potential to achieve outcomes, RCV will adopt a strategic and targeted approach to State Government advocacy. Other Victorian Government lobbying targets are below:



Department of Treasury and Finance

While much can be done to develop plans and policies and to argue for them, ultimately action (especially around the delivery of physical and social infrastructure) will require investment, in an environment where funds are tight and there are many conflicting demands.

RCV will continue to educate the three Treasury Ministers and the department's senior officials about the needs of RCV and the state-wide benefits which will flow from meeting those needs through a structured and consistent program of investment.

Department of Planning and Community Development

While Government can plan to support growth, a vibrant private sector involvement is crucial. This demands a positive planning environment.

Another key focus for RCV will be to ensure that the planning regime is regional city-friendly. This will be done at three levels; with local and regional DPCD officials, with DPCD's Melbourne-based hierarchy and with the Minister and his advisers. Interaction with Planning should be both proactive and reactive. RCV will continue to monitor and contribute to DPCD's planning reform agenda.

Additionally, however, RCV will seek to influence regional-specific planning policy which directly meets the needs of RCV communities.

Other Government Departments

It is acknowledged that Regional Development Victoria (RDV) is the important interface for RCV with the State Government. RCV needs to develop its own specific relationships with all government departments.

RCV should seek to influence wider government and departmental polices and to increase the share of infrastructure funding in the regions, particularly in the key delivery portfolios of Transport, Health and Education.

This can be achieved by engagement with Departmental Secretaries annually. Interaction should be three-way: Minister Napthine to encourage his colleagues to meet with RCV; Departmental Secretaries to instruct their departments to deal with RCV on policy matters and RCV to lobby local members in a bi-partisan way.

State Opposition

RCV enjoys a strong relationship with the State Opposition. RCV will seek to strengthen this through regular direct engagement on policy matters and invitations for Shadow Ministers and the Shadow Leader to address RCV meetings.

The aim will be for RCV to advocate to the Opposition and to act as a responsive sounding board for proposed Opposition policies.



Federal Government

The Federal Government is a major source of funding, often in collaboration with local and State Government. RCV is assessing its involvement in Regional Capitals Australia (RCA) (also chaired by the current RCV Chair) to determine the most effective approach to Federal Government advocacy.

Subject to the outcomes of RCV's involvement with RCA and result of the September, 2013, Federal election, RCV will implement a relationshipbuilding program with the office of the Minister for Regional Development and the Minister for Local Government.

Business and industry stakeholders

Underlining RCV's commitment to developing sustainable communities, a greater focus will be placed on communicating with the business and investment sector through briefings and profiling at selected industry events, such as those run by the Victorian Employers' Chamber of Commerce and Industry (VECCI), the Property Council and Infrastructure Partnerships Australia.

A commerce-focussed Celebrating Regional Cities Week designed to further educate business leaders of the benefits and strengths of regional cities and their economies should complement the existing practice of briefing politicians and bureaucrats. Business-focussed events also present RCV with a platform to strengthen the relationship with the Minister for Regional Cities, who has requested RCV engage more with audiences outside of Government and bureaucracy.

RCV communities

Through its member councils RCV is delivering outcomes that benefit local communities. However, there appears to be no consistent process for communicating those achievements and, as such, residents of RCV's communities are largely unaware of the group's actions.

Better engagement of RCV communities who can lobby local politicians and support RCV's asks through media stories and community events will strengthen RCV lobbying activities.

Tools and tactics to improve communication with residents, businesses, community groups and government are included in the communications section of this plan.

RCV should also aim at holding one group meeting in an RCV city each year. The meetings would be used to build stakeholder relationships and raise awareness of RCV and its activities among target audiences, while providing a hook for media coverage.

Communications strategy

RCV members have existing means to communicate with residents and local businesses, such as internal publications, local media connections as well as industry, community and business newsletters.

Increasing connectivity between these teams and stimulating the distribution of RCV material will help RCV better connect with residents, inform business of investment updates and opportunities and spread information regarding jobs and local amenities upgrades.

It is also important that positive messages and updates on key RCV activities, such as advocacy successes, releasing policy positions and research reports be distributed among councils' communications teams.

Reacting quickly to media opportunities will entrench RCV as the 'go-to' voice for matters concerning regional Victoria. It is important that RCV has the means of identifying these opportunities immediately and have the processes in place to leverage the best outcome.

Establishing a robust media monitoring system and utilising existing media monitoring services is crucial to achieving this outcome.

Digital tools

The RCV website will be regularly reviewed to ensure the content is up to date and accurately portrays the position, purpose, activities and achievements of RCV.

Similarly, the RCV Twitter account is a valuable tool to complement other communications activities and will be maintained by the secretariat in consultation with RCV members.

Governance

RCV will hold meetings bi-monthly, with fortnightly work in progress with the Chairman, the CEO of the auspicing council and the secretariat.

BACKGROUND

Latrobe City through valued partnerships with local community groups, sporting associations and the Latrobe City Youth Band has seen over 520 young people from Latrobe City experience Japanese and/or Chinese culture through exchanges with our Sister Cities.

In 2004 and 2008, the Latrobe City Youth Band toured Takasago, Japan and Taizhou, China. The Youth Band was made up of players aged between 14 and 23 and included up to 27 players.

Both were very successful programs enabling members of local bands the opportunity to perform in front of an international audience. In 2004 the bands five performances in Taizhou, China attracted an audience in excess of 10,000 in total.

Music has long been considered a truly international language, without barriers and prejudices. Formed specifically for the 2004 and 2008 tours, the Latrobe City Youth Band has provided participating students with the opportunity to develop and demonstrate their musical and personal skills through active participation in rehearsals, performances and structured lessons. The tours to our Sister Cities undertaken in 2004 and 2008 have enhanced the appreciation of the arts and culture of all participants. Latrobe City Councils Sister Cities Agreements include the following clauses.

- That each city shall strive to promote the interchanging of ideas, culture and education and shall encourage the promotion of youth and cultural changes to promote cultural awareness.
- That the promotion of different sporting and tourism events be encouraged to exchange ideas and to co-ordinate the staging of events to encourage participation from both countries.

The Latrobe City Youth Band performed between and after the 2004 and 2008 tours but numbers declined over time and the Youth Band was officially dissolved in 2010.

ISSUES

The following key action was adopted by Council as part of the International Relation Plan 2011-2014:

Following consultation with key community members associated with the former Latrobe City Youth Band, including the International Relations Committee and expanding on and making accessible the range of existing cultural, sporting, educational and exchange opportunities for the residence of Latrobe City, the formation of a 'Latrobe City Band' for the purpose of participating in the 2013/2014 Music Exchange program is proposed.

The band will have a life span of 18-24 months with members undergoing an audition process, rehearsals, and local performances and fund raising for the tour, culminating in an overseas tour to Latrobe's Sister Cities.

It is envisaged that the band will comprise of a 30 to 35 player concert band bringing together talented instrumentalists, from all socio-economic backgrounds and age groups within the municipality. The band will provide the City's community with the opportunity for personal growth and enhanced musicianship as members of a 30-35 player concert band.

At the completion of the tour there will be an expectation that members will continue to be proactive ambassadors of our International Relations program. Whilst it is not anticipated that the band will have a lifespan beyond the tour dates, it is likely that the band will perform in Latrobe City both in the lead up and post the international trip.

As the major sponsor, Latrobe City Council will promote the band as the "City's own" to unify the municipality and instil civic pride.

Although titled as being a "music exchange", the music component to this program is only one element with greater learning's and friendships to be made.

The purpose of the program is to continue strengthening the links between Latrobe City Council and our Sister Cities.

Officers met with former band leader David Williams to seek his thoughts on the type of band that should be established and whether he would be interested in taking a lead role with the proposed new touring band. Please see below David's proposal.

Recommendations for Latrobe City Music Exchange Program 2014

For council discussion only,

After discussions with Jason, David and Jei I offer these recommendations for consideration in preparing the 2014 Music Exchange to our sister cities in Japan and China. There are a few things that I strongly urge the council to address in preparing for this exchange, firstly the name of the band. The previous band was called the Latrobe City Youth Band and I believe that the name may have contributed to some players not participating in the band as they may have, rightly or wrongly, that the band was for school age players.

I suggest that in promoting the upcoming exchange that the band be called a Wind Symphony. The name of the touring ensemble should be Latrobe City Wind Symphony or Latrobe City Symphonic Winds. I hope that this will send a more inclusive message to players of postsecondary school age.

Latrobe City Symphonic Winds to comprise of 30 to 35 players consisting of;

Flute, Clarinet, Oboe, Alto Sax, Tenor Sax, Baritone Sax, Trumpet, Trombone, French Horn, Tuba, Keyboards, Drum Kit, Bass, Percussion, Singer (either male of female and preferably someone who is in the band as an instrumentalist to sing)

Option 1

- Band to be comprised of players from ages 15 to 21
- Band members to be auditioned
- Band members to be drawn from the schools within the Latrobe Valley

• Band to have senior mentor players who will act as assistants to the musical director and fill the requirement of chaperones during the tour. Mentor players will be selected members of the broader Latrobe Valley musical community and their role will be to lead sections where appropriate and prepare the band for the rigours of touring. The younger members of the band will be placed in groups and the mentor players will be charged with the role of looking after the younger players on a daily basis.

If this is the preferred option then I urge council to be the face of the recruitment. The previous band I was the public face of not just the performances but also the recruitment and I have to say the negative responses I had from some of the schools in the City was surprising and disappointing. I had on numerous occasions people refer the band as a Moe band or even a Lowanna College band (due significantly to the fact we rehearsed at Lowanna) and I think that a different approach this time might engender more inclusive approach. Council members of the International Relations Committee will need to make contact with all the schools in the city; Lavalla, Kurnai College, Flinders, Traralgon Secondary College, St Paul's Anglican Grammar and Lowanna College. It is vital that a relationship be established with all schools so we maximise the participation of eligible players.

A coordinated visit from the IR committee and the MD to all schools to outline the audition process and the benefits of becoming a member of the band will need to be organised.

Option 2

- Band to be comprised of players from ages 15 to 30
- Band members to be auditioned
- Band members to be drawn from the schools, universities, Tafe colleges and local businesses within the Latrobe Valley

The band to include players of mature age between 15 and 30. This is an idea that is predicated on the believe that the exchange shouldn't just be restricted to just school age players. If this is the preferred option it would allow for a broader range of abilities and interests to enhance the experience for our players and those of our sister cities. Over the past eighteen years that I have taught at Lowanna College I have seen many fine young players go through the school system and then they either leave to study or stay and study locally but many have stopped actively playing. Perhaps the opportunity to tour and be a part of such a terrific exchange may lead to some of these players participating and maintaining their musical interest to the benefit of the community at large.

If you want to recall the first combine bands Australia Day Concert that was held in approx. 2006 where the Youth Band, Traralgon Brass, Morwell Brass and the Bagpipers played, the standard of that particular concert was extremely high due in no small part to the more experienced players that augmented the Youth Band line up of the day.

The audition process

- Auditionees to prepare two contrasting pieces demonstrating a range of stylistic and musical elements
- Prepare a range of excerpts selected for individual instruments i.e. for candidates that what to audition for leading player position such as Clarinet 1 will have to prepare orchestral or band excerpts
- Short sight reading excerpt to prepare
- · Call backs required if two or more candidates appear suitable

Tour fundraising

Fundraising will need to be tightly planned and be spread over the year lead up. For both previous tours we had one big night; Trivia Night and they proved to be extremely successful. I suggest that we plan for a Trivia Night for early 2014 and other fundraising activities to begin later this year and continue well into next year.

Tour organisations

A committee of council, parents, players and MD needs to be formed and charged with the preparation of the tour.

Tour Cultural Awareness

To begin as soon as possible and be held at regular intervals.

Repertoire

The band library is at my house and is extensive enough to provide a suitable range of challenging and musically interesting works. I also urge the council to commission a work for the band to perform on the tour. Our previous tour I took over a work by Australian composer Sarah Hopkins, we could approach her again or someone similar to compose a work based on Australian themes to play on the tour.

Community performances

In preparation for the tour the band will need to schedule community performances. Australia Day 2014 is a must. All band members once they accept the offer to tour they commit to perform on Australia Day.

Possible suggestions for other performances but not limited too; Council sponsored cultural days such as Japanese_Day, Australia Day, Carols by Candlelight and of course a concert in the band own right.

Rehearsals of the band will be at Lowanna College and the band will not travel across the Valley to rehearse. The previous band started by having a shifting rehearsal base and this doesn't work; too many factors that can go wrong. Players forget which venue they are rehearsing at and one time we stood out in the rain for a couple of hours waiting for the key.

Rehearsals

The rehearsal schedule can be problematic, there are established bands, choirs and theatre groups that rehearse during the week and I think that the best option would be rehearse on a Sunday between 1pm to 4pm.

Factoring in that the band won't be formed until later in the year I suggest that the rehearsal schedule be based fortnightly until the end of the year. This approach will allow players to organise their work shifts, study and exam preparations with a minimum of fuss. The band will rehearse up to mid-December and then have a break over Christmas and New Year. The resumption of rehearsals will be prior to Australia Day and all band members must be available for this performance.

Rehearsals leading up to the tour will be weekly; suggest from March 2014 to the tour.

I acknowledge the offer made to me at the previous meeting and would like to formal express my interest in conducting the band once again. I am grateful of the opportunity and humbled to have been asked to prepare the band and see the tour come to fruition. Any discussion on conditions of engagement for the MD can be finalised at a later date.

David Williams OAM

At its meeting held 17 April 2013, the International Relations Advisory Committee considered the proposal from David Williams and made the following recommendations;

- That a third option be considered to include players of mature age. This would see players of a minimum 15 years with no upper age restriction. This is an idea that is predicated on the belief that the exchange shouldn't just be restricted to school age players. This option allows for a broader range of abilities and interests to enhance the experience for our players and those of our sister cities.
- 2. That a name other than those recommended by David Williams be considered. Suggestions included the 'Latrobe City Concert Band' and the 'Latrobe City Music Ensemble'.
- The Committee agreed that David Williams, if endorsed as Music Director for this exchange, should be given creative freedom over the type and style of band formed and the music arrangements played due to his enormous experience not only with previous exchanges to our Sister Cities but also as a professional in his own right.

Additional Information:

Additional Participants:

30-35 piece concert band comprising of members from across Latrobe City. Up to 4 additional people will be required to accompany the tour. These may include a musical director, band manager and Latrobe City Council officers to provide support for protocol, interpreting and tour management of the tour group. All attendees, including officers and Councillors would be considered in line with the *Sister Cities Visits Policy 12-POL-1*.

Proposed Dates:

It is not possible to define actual dates at present, however, based on previous tours a proposed tour of 10-12 days which will comprise of performances, rehearsals, attending Sister Schools, homestays and cultural activities.

An informal invitation to attend the 60 year anniversary of the formation of the City of Takasago in late June 2014 has been received at officer level and this may be a great opportunity to coincide with the proposed Music Exchange.

Roles and responsibilities

Latrobe City Councils sister cities will play a significant support role in hosting the band including arranging homestays, concerts and cultural activities.

Latrobe City Council

Latrobe City Council's International Relations team will coordinate the exchange program in conjunction with support from our Sister Cities and participating band representatives. Key responsibilities include:

- Provide sponsorship to the exchange to the sum of \$25,000.00
- Communicate with Sister Cities
- Planned itinerary and travel arrangements
- Information sessions
- Pre-departure briefing
- Cultural Awareness sessions / information
- Regular newsletter updates
- Support fundraising initiatives
- Council Officers to accompany the tour

Musical Personnel

The bands Musical Director and Manager will play a significant role in supporting Latrobe City Council coordination of the Music Exchange program. Key responsibilities include:

- Selection of suitable and worthy ambassadors from across Latrobe City
- Rehearsals pre-departure will be coordinated and conducted by the Musical Director
- A support group will be required to assist with a well coordinated fundraising program
- Actively participate in fundraising initiatives
- Promote the Music Exchange Program both pre and post tour, including Latrobe City's Sister Cities Festival.
- Ensure all participants meet all travel and medical requirements
- Support Latrobe City Council with the coordination of the tour
- Take responsibility for the welfare of band members whilst on tour

Individual participants

Participating individuals who are fortunate enough to participate in Latrobe City Council's 2013/2014 Music Exchange Program will have the following key responsibilities:

- Be a worthy ambassador
- Complete all mandatory compliance documentation
- Provide proof of residence in Latrobe City
- Actively participate in fundraising initiatives
- Attend information sessions
- Attend Pre-departure briefing
- Attend Cultural Awareness sessions
- Act as a Latrobe City Council international relations ambassador following the tour
- Promote the Music Exchange Program both pre and post tour, including Latrobe City's Sister Cities Festival.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

There is an allocation of \$25,000.00 proposed in Council's 2013/ 2014 draft budget to support the program. The cost for each individual to participate in the exchange is \$2,600.00 of which Council will contribute approximately \$800.00 in sponsorship to each participant.

It should be noted that the true cost of this exchange will exceed \$60,000.00, with the balance of funding raised through sponsorship, fundraising and individual contributions.

Council Officer associated costs with the delegation will be limited to airfares and accommodation (total of approximately \$3,500 per person). It has been normal practice for the host city to provide meals and activities to delegations.

As has been past practice, those Councillors (other than the Mayor or his/her delegate) wishing to attend are invited to join the delegation however will be required to personally fund their own airfares and accommodation expenses.

It is anticipated that individual members of the International Relations Committee may also fund their own expenses to accompany the delegation.

Participation in the music exchange will adhere to councils *Sister City Visits Policy 12-POL-1.*

BACKGROUND

In 2005, Council developed a Road Management Plan (RMP) in response to the implementation of the *Road Management Act 2004 (Vic)*. This is the third review of the plan.

The RMP identifies the responsibilities, maintenance standards and inspection regimes required to manage Council's road assets including footpath, kerb and channel, bridges and roads. The RMP is supported by Council's Public Road Register, which is a document that identifies the roads for which Council is responsible (the Public Road Register is not part of this review).

The RMP review process ensures the document is aligned with Council's current policies and procedures.

While a road authority is not obliged to have a RMP, the RMA states that a road authority (of which Latrobe City Council is one) that has made a RMP must conduct a review of that plan in accordance with the regulations. The RMA states that a municipal council must commence a review of the RMP by 1st January 2013 and complete that review by 30 June 2013. The Road Management (General) Regulations 2005, r301 state:

"A road authority that has a road management plan must conduct a review of that plan" and "conduct a review of its road management plan within the period referred to in section 125 (1) (b) of the Local Government Act 1989". "In conducting a review of its road management plan, a road authority must ensure that the standards in relation to, and the priorities to be given to, the inspection, maintenance and repair of the roads and classes of road to which the plan applies are appropriate."

The RMP is not an asset management plan. The long term asset management requirements will be detailed in the individual Asset Management Plans for each of the Bridge, Footpath and Road Asset Management Plans.

The RMP Review occurs every four years and this is the time when the Road Maintenance classifications in the 'Road and Path Hierarchy/Classification' (refer to page 13 & 14 of the Draft RMP) are examined and determined. This hierarchy is included in the Public Road Register and applied to roads in the municipality. The Public Road Register is a dynamic document that is updated during the life of the RMP. It may be changed at any time under officer delegation as long as the request to change the status of a particular road or road segment meets the criteria outlined in the 'Road and Path Hierarchy/Classification' section of the RMP.

ISSUES

The *Road Management Act 2004* requires Council to review its Road Management Plan at certain prescribed times. The current RMP has been reviewed by Council Officers from Infrastructure Development and Infrastructure Operations department, after attending training on legal implications, service levels and general road management issues. There have been extra workshops held with key Infrastructure Operations staff regarding the current road maintenance practices and any improvements that can be made.

Whilst the RMP outlines Council's response to defects and hazards it does not necessarily reflect current standards of maintenance within Council. It is good management practice to be responding to defects and hazards as well as proactively working to eliminate defects.

The review process is briefly described below and involves the following key steps in accordance with the RMA and subordinate regulations:

1. Review Notice

Council must give a notice stating or describing:

- The purpose of the review;
- The roads and classes of road to which the RMP applies;
- Where a copy of the current RMP may be obtained or inspected; and

• That any person may make a submission on the proposed review to Council within the period specified in the notice, being not less than 28 days after the date on which the notice is given.

A notice under this regulation must be published in the Government Gazette and in a daily newspaper circulating in the area in which the RMP applies.

2. Public Submissions

The Regulations state that a "submission" can be made by any person. Written submissions would be called pursuant to S223 of the Local Government Act 1989 to ensure a manageable process for the review.

3. Report to Council on the RMP review

Having heard the submissions a further report will be prepared for Council consideration responding to the submissions and outlining any proposed changes to either the RMP or Road Register.

4. Proposed Review Timetable

The proposed timeline for the review is presented in the table below and will be adjusted according to any changes in schedules resulting from public submissions or further requests for information:

This proposed timeline will complete the review process within the governing time frame set out in the Road Management (General) Regulations 2005.

There are a number of requirements that need to be satisfied upon the Review completion. After the Council has completed the review of its RMP it must:

- Produce a written report summarising the findings and conclusions of the review; and;
- Make this report available for copying or inspection at the place where the RMP may be inspected or obtained.

The current RMP is available on the Latrobe City Council website and it is proposed to update this plan on the 'Roads and Drains' page of the website.

In respect of the content of the RMP, there are some proposed changes for Councillors to note:

- Updated road lengths from 1500 to 1560 kms.
- Boolarra Mirboo North Road has been removed as it is now Council responsibility and Tramway Road has been added to the 'Current List of Vic Roads Declared Main Roads within Latrobe City'.
- Path Hierarchy description has been expanded to reflect the current practice of inspecting smaller towns.
- Removal of range of times to indicate when inspections will take place. A maximum time is now reflected to mirror the current practice of Council Officers who inspect at these frequencies.
- Removal of 2009-2013 footpath inspection program and update of footpath inspection dates to reflect 2013-2017 inspection program.
- 'Erect signage within 24 hours of detection or notification' has been added to categories to ensure adequate warning of hazards.

All proposed changes are detailed on page 2 of the attached Draft Road Management Plan 2013-2017.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

The *Road Management Act 2004 (Vic)* also clarifies the law relating to civil liability for the management of public roads.

Compliance with the RMP limits Council's public liability to legal action from claims for damages for incidents attributable to the use of these assets. A sound Road Management Plan provides a reasonable level of policy defence. This ensures Council is not liable for an act or omission, which has been undertaken in accordance with an approved policy of the municipality (provided it does not constitute a wrongful act or failure to act). The policy defence is limited to the extent that it must not be so unreasonable that no municipal council in that position acting reasonably could have made that policy.

INTERNAL/EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

Engagement Method Used:

Council must give notice in the Government Gazette and in a newspaper circulating in the area (the Latrobe Valley Express), stating the purpose and general purport of the revised road management plan, where a copy of the proposed plan may be viewed and that any person may make a submission within the period specified in the notice. At least 28 days after the day on which a notice is published must be allowed for the making of submissions.

Details of Community Consultation / Results of Engagement:

Council is requesting feedback from the community on the proposed changes to the Road Management Plan. It is expected that a number of residents may use the Road Management Plan Review as an opportunity to request a change to the Public Road Register. In order to ensure that these requests are considered, Council will provide a 'Frequently Asked Questions' (FAQ's) sheet and a 'Request for Change to Public Road Register' form with the Review to enable those residents to make such a request.

Results of community engagement will be presented to Council after public submissions have been received.

OPTIONS

Council has the following options available:

1. Advertise the Road Management Plan for public submissions. This is the preferred option as the *Road Management Act 2004* (*Vic*) requires Council to review its Road Management Plan at certain prescribed times. This legislated review must have commenced by 1 January 2013 and be completed by 30 June 2013.

While a road authority is not obliged to have a RMP, the RMA states that a road authority that has made a RMP must conduct a review of that plan in accordance with the regulations. Therefore Council does not have the option of not conducting a review of the RMP.

2. Request amendments to the RMP prior to releasing for submissions.

CONCLUSION

The review of the Latrobe City Council's RMP is a requirement of the Road Management (General) Regulations 2005 and is required to be completed by 30 June 2013.

The RMA requires a review of the RMP every 4 years, which coincides with the Council Plan review requirements. The review procedure requires Council to call for submissions from the public. Submissions are required to be accepted for a minimum of 28 days after advertising the RMP in accordance with the *Road Management Act 2004 (Vic)*.

Public submissions will be managed through a formal S223 process (Local Government Act). A formal report will be prepared for Council consideration following the submission process outlining and any proposed changes to the Plan.

It is proposed that the review process be commenced and the requisite notices be published in the Government Gazette, and the Latrobe Valley Express accordingly.



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Introduction

Latrobe City Council has developed this Road Management Plan (RMP) in response to the Road Management Act 2004 (RMA). The RMP was originally adopted by Council in 2005 and this is the second third revision of that plan.

This plan is made under Division 5 of the RMA and the objective is to have regard to the principle object of road management and the works and infrastructure management principles and to establish a management system based on policy and operational objectives and available resources and to set relevant standards in the performance of those road management functions.

This RMP sets out the responsibilities of Council and also the responsibilities of other stakeholders including road users. The primary objective of this plan is to balance community expectations for service with the ability of Council to fund the capital and operational costs of its infrastructure. The road and path assets should provide an appropriate level of service that is fit for purpose, accessible, responsive and sustainable to the community in accordance with the Council Plan, Asset Management Policy and Asset Management Strategy.

The long term assessment of the asset management requirements will be detailed in individual Asset Management Plans for Bridges, Footpaths and Roads.

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Legislation

The following Victorian legislation applies to the Road Management Plan:

Road Management Act 2004 Road Management (General) Regulations 2005 Road Safety Act 1986

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Scope of this Plan

This plan addresses the maintenance standards and systems for road management functions and the levels of service for Latrobe City's bridges, paths, road pavement and associated infrastructure on the 1500 1560 km of sealed and unsealed municipal road network for which the Council is the coordinating or responsible road authority.

The full list of roads for which Council is responsible can be viewed in Appendix 1 – Register of Public Roads.

Freeways and their associated infrastructure are the sole responsibility of VicRoads and the road pavement on arterial roads is also maintained by VicRoads with Council maintaining the area outside the road pavement and kerbs. Each party's exact areas of responsibility for different road situations is set out in the Code of Practice – Operational Responsibility for Public Roads which is accessible on the VicRoads website at:




Figure 1 - Typical VicRoads Declared Main Road

Figure 1 below shows a typical cross section showing Council's area of responsibility outside the kerbs of the VicRoads declared main road. Any service lanes and paths outside of this area whether on a single or dual carriageway are Council's responsibility.

Council is negotiating agreements with Wellington and South Gippsland Shire Councils and already has an agreement with Baw Baw Shire Council that sets out each Council's responsibilities in relation to roads and bridges for the municipal boundaries. There are also some roads in Latrobe City where the Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE) is the responsible road authority and details of these roads and the level of service may be obtained from DSE.

Utility infrastructure including telecommunications, power, gas, water and sewer are not the responsibility of Latrobe City Council, however one aim of the RMA is to facilitate the coordination of the various uses of road reserves for roadways, pathways, infrastructure and similar purposes.

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Although Council is not responsible for power distribution it does pay a street lighting tariff to supply and maintain public lighting on Council maintained roads and contributes towards lighting on arterial roads, but not freeways.

Private vehicular crossings are not included in this plan as they are the responsibility of the landowner whose property they enter (Vehicle Crossing Policy 11 POL-4). Likewise nature strips are not included in this plan as the maintenance of these is the responsibility of the abutting landowners. Drainage networks and roadside vegetation are not included in the scope of this plan along with any artwork within the road reserve. Private roads, private laneways, private body corporate roads and private carparks are also not included in this RMP.

Convex Mirrors have been included in the RMP following the release of the VicRoads Traffic Management Note No. 27 – Installation of Convex Mirrors on Public Roads. This RMP covers only convex mirrors that have been installed to assist traffic on the road network and does not include convex mirrors that have been installed for the sole purpose of servicing a private driveway for access onto a through road, regardless of whether it has been installed within a road reserve. Any person(s) wishing to install a convex mirror within a road reserve for the sole purpose of servicing a private driveway for access onto a through road must obtain Council approval and installation will be undertaken by Council at the owner's cost. Council is not responsible for the maintenance or replacement of these convex mirrors.

Council will undertake an audit of convex mirrors that are currently on roads managed by Council to ensure they comply with the conditions set out in the VicRoads Traffic Management Note No. 27 – Installation of Convex Mirrors on Public Roads.

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Relationship of RMP with other Key Council Documents




Figure 2 - Relationship between the Road Management Plan and other Council Documents

The Road Management Act offers Council the opportunity to produce a Road Management Plan to gain protection in certain circumstances. Figure 2 shows the link between Council's Road Management Plan to the Asset Management Strategy, Asset Management Policy, Council Plan and Latrobe 2024<mark>6</mark>.

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Responsibility of Road Users

All road users have a duty of care under Section 105 of the RMA, with particular obligations prescribed in Section 17A of the Road Safety Act 1986 that requires the following:

Obligations of Road Users

A person who drives a motor vehicle on a public road must drive in a safe manner having regard to all the relevant factors including (without limiting the generality) the –

- Physical characteristics of the road;
- Prevailing weather conditions;
- Level of visibility;
- Condition of the motor vehicle;
- Prevailing traffic conditions;
- Relevant road laws and advisory signs;
- Physical and mental condition of driver.

A road user other than a person driving a motor vehicle must use a public road in a safe manner having regard to all the relevant factors.

A road user must –

- Have regard to the rights of other road users and take reasonable care to avoid any conduct that may endanger the safety or welfare of other road users;
- Have regard to the rights of the community and infrastructure managers in relation to the road infrastructure and non-road infrastructure on the road reserve and take reasonable care to avoid any conduct that may damage road infrastructure on the road reserve;
- Have regard to the rights of the community in relation to the road reserve and take reasonable care to avoid conduct that may harm the environment of the road reserve.

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Road and Path Hierarchy/Classification

Latrobe City has adopted a Road Hierarchy that is essentially based on road functionality and traffic management criteria. In accordance with the <u>Code of Practice for Road</u> <u>Management Plans</u>, that is available on the Victorian Government website at http://www.gazette.vic.gov.au/Gazettes2004/GG2004S201.pdf, there has been an internal review of Council's road hierarchy, giving higher importance to risk assessment and the appropriate levels of inspection and maintenance for each classification. This RMP has different maintenance interventions, inspection frequencies and response times for each road classification.

It is proposed that there be six basic road hierarchies relating to maintenance:

- Link Road
- Collector Road
- Sealed Access Road with a speed limit greater than 60 km/hr and all Unsealed Access Roads
- Sealed Access Road with a speed limit less than or equal to 60 km/hr
- Minor Access Road
- Limited Access Road

The Access Road hierarchy has been split into two categories to allow inspections to be more frequent on unsealed roads and the higher speed, sealed roads as they pose a higher safety risk to drivers in the event of defects developing on these roads.

The hierarchical system has been reviewed against other Gippsland Councils with the aim of minimising the likelihood of significantly different service standards on municipal boundaries.

There is no hierarchy for Latrobe's bridges and major culverts, all are inspected as per the VicRoads Bridge Inspection Manual.

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The following tables provide an overview on how Latrobe City's roads and paths have been classified. Roads may be segmented along their length with the result being that a road may be classified under more than one hierarchy. This happens more in the rural areas where the distance between houses becomes greater and as the houses become sparser along a section of road the standard of road also generally decreases. The lowest category for a sealed road is an Access Road.

A "Standard Constructed" road is one that was built to a level that was acceptable to Council at the time of construction. It would have a reasonable formation width, pavement material, table drains, culverts if required and guideposts installed. A "Non Standard" road may have some of these things, for example some minor earthworks and even some road pavement material however Council will not automatically categorise these roads as "Standard Constructed". Any sealed road would be listed as "Standard Constructed" and would have a minimum classification of an Access Road.

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The following table is a guide to the classification to Council's Paths:

A path classification has been developed, based principally on the volume of usage (both pedestrian and cyclists if applicable). The path classifications are High Usage, Medium Usage and Low Usage.

The following table defines the path hierarchies adopted:

Path Hierarchy Classifications	Definition
High Usage -Red	Central Business Districts of the following major townships – Moe, Newborough, Morwell, Churchill and Traralgon. Main streets of the townships of Boolarra, Glengarry, Toongabbie, Tyers, Yallourn North and Yinnar. Areas identified as potential high risk due to the nature and volume of pedestrian traffic associated with particular properties adjacent to Council footpaths. These properties include schools, pre-schools, medical precincts and elderly person precincts.
Medium Usage - Blue	Heavily pedestrianised areas: - minor-shopping areas, collector paths and <mark>some</mark> shared bicycle/pedestrian paths.
Low Usage - Green	Constructed paths in residential and commercial areas, and rural residential areas; including concrete, asphalt, and gravel paths.

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Inspection Schedules

Roads

Trained Council inspectors will inspect all roads for which Council is responsible. Inspections have been scheduled on a cyclical basis to identify potential safety hazards, and defects which are approaching intervention levels. The inspection program reflects the road priority identified in the road classification system and appropriate use of resources. Inspection frequencies are as follows:

- 1. Link roads one (1) inspection every 4-88 weeks.
- 2. Collector roads one (1) inspection every 4–8 8 weeks.
- Access Roads that are unsealed or are sealed (in a speed zone greater than 60km/hr)

 one (1) inspection every 12–15 15 weeks.
- Access Roads that are sealed (in a speed zone equal to or less than 60km/hr) one (1) inspection every 20 30 weeks.
- 5. Minor Access roads one (1) inspection every 20– 30 30 weeks.
- 6. Limited access road one (1) inspection each year.

In addition to being identified through the routine monitoring system, defects are logged into Council's Customer Service Request System from other sources, including identification by a citizen or a councillor. The defects are then assessed and actioned.

Bridges & Major Culverts

Inspections of bridges and major culverts are programmed in accordance with the VicRoads Bridge Inspection Manual for all structures with a single span or diameter of 1.8m or greater or have a waterway area of 3 m^2 or greater.

Level 1 - Inspections carried out two times per year.

Level 2 - Inspections carried out on new structures within twelve months and then on a two yearly cycle.

Level 3 - Inspections carried out on the recommendation of a Level 1 or 2 inspection.

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Paths

All high usage paths are inspected every year. Medium usage paths are inspected on a two yearly cycle. Low usage paths are inspected on a three yearly cycle.

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Maintenance Standards

Latrobe City Council has identified the critical maintenance defects for all paths and roads for which it is responsible. For each defect, the following criteria have been developed:

- 1. The level at which the defect is a potential safety hazard,
- 2. The level at which a defect reaches a maximum point of treatment intervention.
- 3. The maximum time allowable within which defects must be repaired.

The defects identified as critical for roads are:

- 1. Rutting All roads
- 2. Potholes All roads
- 3. Signage All roads
- 4. Cracking Sealed roads only
- 5. Edge breaks Sealed roads only
- 6. Edge drop off Sealed roads only
- 7. Loose material Unsealed roads only
- 8. Corrugations Unsealed roads only
- 9. Crossfall Unsealed roads only
- 10. Gravel depth Unsealed roads only

The Latrobe City Outdoor Maintenance Unit - Maintenance Activity & Procedures Manual details all the inspection criteria, methods to measure and assess these defects and also the method and standard of repair.

The main defect identified for footpaths are trip steps which may be either transverse or longitudinal or caused by spalling. The Latrobe City Council - Footpath Marking and Maintenance Assessment Methodology manual details the inspection criteria, methods to measure and assess these defects and the method and standard of repair.

Bridge defects are covered by the VicRoads Bridge Inspection Manual.

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Intervention Levels and Response Times

The Intervention Levels and Response Times are included in Appendix 2. The service level tables include:

- 1. Defect/Activity Intervention Levels by Hierarchy.
- 2. Response Times by Hierarchy.
- 3. Repair Activity.
- 4. Inspection Regime by Hierarchy to identify defects.

Council emphasises that the intervention levels are a maximum allowable figure and in reality maintenance crews will attempt to repair defects before they reach intervention levels in line with optimal maintenance practices. It should also be noted that major repairs will not be carried out on roads that are scheduled to be rehabilitated. In these instances temporary repairs may be carried out or alternately warning signs may be used to highlight defects until the permanent works are undertaken.

Although Council will make every endeavour to meet its obligations under this plan, circumstances may arise where Council may not meet all or any of its obligations. If these circumstances are beyond the control of Council, then Council reserves its right to suspend this plan.

In the event of natural disasters and events such as fires, storms and floods, as well as human factors, but not limited to lack of Council staff or suitably qualified contractors, because of Section 83 of the Victorian Wrongs Act, 1958, as amended, Council reserves the right to suspend compliance with its Plan.

In the event that the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Latrobe City Council, has to, pursuant to Section 83 of the Victorian Wrongs Act, consider the limited financial resources of Council and its other conflicting priorities, meaning Council's RMP cannot be met, the CEO will write to inform the Council Officer in charge of its plan Manager Infrastructure Operations that some or all of the timeframes and responses in Council's Plan, are to be suspended.

Once the events beyond the control of Council have abated, or if the events have partly abated, Council's Chief Executive Officer will write to inform the Council Officer responsible for Council's RMP Manager Infrastructure Operations which parts of Council's RMP are to be reactivated and when.

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Basis for Developing Service Levels

In line with the requirements of the Road Management Act, Latrobe City's initial process of developing service levels for the original RMP involved the following:

- Assessment of what the community wanted through the Best Value Review Process and collating the available data available on service level responsiveness through Council's Customer Request and Tracking System.
- 2. Determined the areas and functions of priority, based on customer complaints data, insurance claims data and maintenance staff knowledge.
- 3. Determined the financial gaps between current strategic service levels and expected strategic service levels through a process of strategic financial modelling.

Since the review of the RMP in 2005 2009, Council has had the opportunity to evaluate the adopted service levels and confirm that they are achievable with the existing budget. This amended RMP uses that information to provide a degree of confidence in the hierarchies and service levels.

Council acknowledges that the level of service provided to all roads will not necessarily please all stakeholders however these levels have been determined by the resources available to Council, both financial and physical.

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Management System

Council's management system records the defects identified by trained personnel while carrying out inspections in accordance with the timeframes listed in Section 6 – Inspection Schedules.

There are different regimes in place for inspections of sealed and unsealed roads, bridges and also for path inspections. The defects identified during the road and bridge inspections are directly entered onto a running sheet which is later entered into Council's Customer/Request Management System – Pathway. This system is then used to monitor the defects and to ensure that they are rectified within the timeframes set for that particular defect and hierarchy. Council acknowledges that this is an area where continuous improvement may see the introduction of a more integrated asset management system (AMS) including electronic data capture.

The defects identified during the path inspections are directly entered into an electronic device which automatically records location and saves any other inspection data. Upon returning to the office this data is electronically downloaded into an electronic database and then loaded into Council's Geographical Information System. Repairs are then programmed according to the intervention levels and hierarchy.

Upon completion of the repair the date and time of the repair is recorded against the defect in the database.

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2. Appendix 2

Intervention Levels and Response Times

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Force Majeure

Although Council will make every endeavour to meet its obligations under this plan, circumstances may arise where Council may not meet all or any of its obligations. If these circumstances are beyond the control of Council, then Council reserves its right to suspend this plan.

In the event of natural disasters and events such as fires, storms and floods, as well as human factors, but not limited to lack of Council staff or suitably qualified contractors, because of Section 83 of the Victorian Wrongs Act, 1958, as amended, Council reserves the right to suspend compliance with its Plan.

In the event that the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Latrobe City Council, has to, pursuant to Section 83 of the Victorian Wrongs Act, consider the limited financial resources of Council and its other conflicting priorities, meaning Council's RMP cannot be met, the CEO will write to inform the Council Officer in charge of its plan Manager Infrastructure Operations that some or all of the timeframes and responses in Council's Plan, are to be suspended.

Once the events beyond the control of Council have abated, or if the events have partly abated, Council's Chief Executive Officer will write to inform the Council Officer responsible for the RMP Manager Infrastructure Operations which parts of Council's RMP are to be reactivated and when.

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Latrobe City Intervention Levels and Response Times for Roads

Maintenance standards, as defined in the ministerial code of practice, are considered to be the levels of service or targets set by council consistent with its management of risks and available resources. These maintenance levels are not intended to increase the level of service of a road, but are only designed to maintain what already exists.

The response times for Access Roads include the sealed Access Roads with a speed limit less than or equal to 60km/hr and the sealed Access Roads with a speed limit greater than 60 km/hr and all unsealed Access Roads.

If a sealed road is on a funded rehabilitation program, then it would be irresponsible to undertake major repair works only to reconstruct the pavement a short time later. Therefore in these situations warning signs may be used for defects that exceed the intervention levels until the pavement is rehabilitated.

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Latrobe City Intervention Levels and Response Times for Paths

Footpath and shared path maintenance intervention targets, inspection frequencies and response times are determined by available budget and potential risk to pedestrians and path users.

The risk assessment considers volume and type of usage, proximity to schools, elderly persons facilities and medical precincts, resulting in three broad classifications as follows:-

H: High Usage M: Medium Usage L: Low Usage

Note 1. It is proposed to replace all brick and concrete pavers with standard concrete paving when capital funds are available. Areas of damaged pavers >2 m² are to be referred to the Capital Works Program. These failed areas may need to be progressively replaced in concrete as funds become available.

Note 2. Asphalt paths are to be assessed prior to undertaking major repairs, to consider the complete replacement of the asphalt with concrete paving.

Note 3. Gravel paths are prone to significant erosion following heavy rain and will be repaired as soon as resources are available after a storm event.

Note 4. Council will not maintain nature strips and sweep footpaths of leaves, nuts and fruits from street trees. Inappropriate street trees that drop nuts and fruits on paths will be replaced under the Tree Management Plan as funds become available.

Note 5. There are areas in the City where groundwater flows over paths and creates a potential hazard. When areas are identified where the water flow cannot be controlled, signs will be erected warning of the hazard. Extensive investigation and drainage works have not been able to solve existing problem areas.

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Overhanging trees/vegetation.

The safety inspections that are undertaken also include looking at overhanging trees and vegetation from both street trees and from private property.

Overhanging street trees will be pruned to provide 2.1m vertical clearance over paths on a programmed basis in accordance with these inspection frequencies.

Council's Local Laws staff will follow up the property owners of overhanging private trees in accordance with the Local Law.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to present to Council the draft Domestic Animal Management Plan 2013-17 and to seek approval to release the draft Plan for community comment.

DECLARATION OF INTEREST

No officer declared an interest under the Local Government Act 1989 in the preparation of this report.

STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK

This report is consistent with Latrobe 2026: The Community Vision for Latrobe Valley and the Latrobe City Council Plan 2012-16.

Latrobe 2026: The Community Vision for Latrobe Valley

Strategic Objectives – Our Community

In 2026, Latrobe Valley is one of the most liveable regions in Victoria, known for its high quality health, education and community services, supporting communities that are safe, connected and proud.

Strategic Objectives – Regulation and Accountability

In 2026, Latrobe Valley demonstrates respect for the importance of rules and laws to protect people's rights, outline obligations and support community values and cohesion.

Latrobe City Council Plan 2012 – 2016

Strategic Direction – Our Community

Provide support, assistance and quality services in partnership with relevant stakeholders to improve the health, wellbeing and safety of all within Latrobe City.

Facilitate and support initiatives that strengthen the capacity of the community.

Provide access to information, knowledge, technology and activities that strengthens and increases participation in community life.

Promote community participation and volunteerism to support improved health and wellbeing through all stages of life.

Strategic Direction – Regulation and Accountability

Legislation – Domestic Animals Act 1994

Section 68A Councils to prepare domestic animal management plans Part (1) every Council must, in consultation with the Secretary, prepare at 4 year intervals a domestic animal management plan.

BACKGROUND

Under the provision of Section 68A of the *Domestic Animals Act 1994 (the Act)*, all Victorian Councils are required to prepare a Domestic Animal Management Plan, which is to be reviewed every four years.

Domestic Animal Management Plans aim to outline the services, programs and strategies a Council has established to address the administration of the Act, and the management of dogs and cats within their community.

Copies of Plans and any subsequent amendments are to be submitted to the Secretary of the Department of Primary Industries once adopted by Councils.

The original Latrobe City Council Domestic Animal Management Plan 2008 was adopted by Council at its Ordinary Council Meeting on 20 October 2008 as per the Act, and is now due for review.

ISSUES

As contained in *Section 68A (2) of the Act*, a Domestic Animal Management Plan prepared by Council must:

- (a) set out a method for evaluating whether the animal control services provided by the Council in its municipal district are adequate to give effect to the requirements of this Act and the regulations; and
- (b) outline programs for the training of authorised officers to ensure that they can properly administer and enforce the requirements of this Act in the Council's municipal district; and
- (c) outline programs, services and strategies which the Council intends to pursue in its municipal district:
 - *(i) to promote and encourage the responsible ownership of dogs and cats; and*
 - (ii) to ensure that people comply with this Act, the regulations and any related legislation; and
 - *(iii)* to minimise the risk of attacks by dogs on people and animals; and
 - *(iv)* to address any over-population and high euthanasia rates for dogs and cats; and
 - (v) to encourage the registration and identification of dogs and cats; and
 - (vi) to minimise the potential for dogs and cats to create a nuisance; and
 - (vii) to effectively identify all dangerous dogs, menacing dogs and restricted breed dogs in that district and to ensure that those dogs are kept in compliance with this Act and the regulations; and
- (d) provide for the review of existing orders made under this Act and local laws that relate to the Council's municipal district with a view to determining whether further orders or local laws dealing with the management of dogs and cats in the municipal district are desirable; and
- (e) provide for the review of any other matters related to the management of dogs and cats in the Council's municipal district that it thinks necessary; and

(f) provide for the periodic evaluation of any program, service, strategy or review outlined under the plan.

The Latrobe City Council Domestic Animal Management Plan 2008 contains the following six key focus areas:

- Staff Training and Development
- Community Education and Promotion of responsible pet ownership
- Identification and Registration
- Compliance and Enforcement
- Domestic Animal Businesses
- Declared Dogs

Key actions delivered from the current Plan include:

Training and Development

- Five Local Laws Officers completed Certificate 4 in Animal Control.
 - One Local Laws Officer has received individual recognition as:
 - Australian Institute of Animal Management, Animal Management Officer of the Year 2009
 - NAIDOC Achievement Award 2011.

Community Education

- Over ten radio spots regarding responsible pet ownership microchipping, desexing and registration requirements were conducted on local radio.
- Information caravan visits were provided in the townships of Yinnar and Boolarra.
- Successful implementation of the Council resolution for the desexing of all dogs and cats registered for the first time.
- 100% success rate in re-housing 'Pet of the Week' animals.

Identification and Registration

- Conducted annual discount microchipping weeks prior to the animal registration due date of 10 April.
- Successfully implemented Council resolution in relation to compulsory microchipping and desexing.

Compliance and Enforcement

 Annual review of procedure relating to animal management matters, including the development of a new procedure in relation to barking dogs in 2009.

Domestic Animal Business

 A successful Domestic Animal Business workshop for current and prospective proprietors was hosted by Local Laws staff at Latrobe City Corporate Headquarters in April 2010 which attracted 37 attendees. Dangerous, Menacing and Restricted Breed Dogs

- Patrols conducted within Commercial/Industrial areas to identify guard dogs on premises.
- Ensured that all Declared Dangerous, Menacing or Restricted Breed Dogs were recorded on the Victorian Declared Dog Registry.
- Property inspections were conducted to ensure compliance with the Act on all registered declared dogs.

The review of the Domestic Animal Management Plan has spanned two financial years, with the finalisation of the review identified as a major initiative in the Council Plan 2012-16.

Stakeholder consultation was undertaken in the form of a survey between November 2011 and January 2012. Street surveys were conducted by independent contractors; copies were distributed by mail to 500 randomly selected ratepayers and identified key stakeholders including animal clubs, animal welfare groups and local veterinarians. They were made available in our service centres & libraries and advertised on Council's Noticeboard and online.

A total of 354 surveys were returned. Responses have been collated and are presented as Attachment One. The responses indicate:

- 75% of surveyed cat owners had registered their cats.
- 87.5% of surveyed cat owners had desexed their cats.
- 63.8% of surveyed respondents are aware of our 9pm-6am cat curfew.
- 86.4% of surveyed respondents agree with the cat curfew.
- 42.6% of surveyed respondents believe there is a problem with stray cats in their area.
- 70% of surveyed respondents agree with compulsory desexing of cats.
- 51.9% of surveyed respondents are aware we have cat cages for hire.
- 52.2% of surveyed dog owners have taken their dogs to obedience training.
- 87.4% of surveyed dog owners had registered their dogs.
- 66.8% of surveyed dog owners had desexed their dogs.
- 21.7% of surveyed respondents believe there is a problem with stray dogs in their area.

- 45.4% of surveyed respondents agree with compulsory desexing of dogs.
- 90.1% of surveyed respondents are aware of the Local Law to pick up dog droppings.
- 23.7% of surveyed respondents believe there is a problem with dog droppings in their area.
- 42% of surveyed respondents are aware we offer a discounted microchipping week.
- 80% of respondents who have visited our pound rate the assistance of staff good to excellent.
- 62.1% of surveyed respondents support the current pound operating times.

Survey responses indicate a need to promote the services offered by Council, to increase community awareness.

The draft Domestic Animal Management Plan 2013-17 has been developed in accordance with the Act and contains the following eight key focus areas:

- Training of Authorised Officers
- Registration and Identification
- Animal Nuisance Complaints
- Dog Attacks
- Dangerous Menacing and Restricted Breed Dogs
- Over-Population and High Euthanasia
- Domestic Animal Businesses
- Municipal Pound

Actions proposed in the draft Domestic Animal Management Plan 2013-17 include:

Training of Authorised Officers

- Identify minimum training for officers.
- Develop and maintain a training register.
- Ensure that all Authorised officers have completed minimum training requirements within twelve months of employment.

Registration and Identification

- Improve the accuracy of Council registration database by cross referencing microchip registry data.
- Partner with local pet shops, domestic animal businesses and veterinarians to distribute animal registration information with each pet sale.
- Facilitate discount microchipping sessions prior to April each year.

Animal Nuisance Complaints

- Maintain accurate and relevant information on Council's website.
- Develop a user friendly complaint lodgement, investigation and response process to facilitate timely resolutions.
- Maintain an appropriate supply of cat cages for hire.

<u>Dog Attacks</u>

- Develop a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Australia Post to report all dog attacks, rushes, wandering animals.
- Increase public understanding and awareness of what a dog attack is and how to report attacks.
- Promote a greater awareness of the consequence for owners of dogs who attack.

Dangerous Menacing and Restricted Breed Dogs

- Ensure all declared menacing, dangerous and Restricted Breed dogs are entered into the Victorian Declared Dog Registry.
- Increase public understanding and awareness of dangerous, menacing and Restricted Breed dogs.
- Inspect industrial properties throughout the municipality for dogs housed or kept for guarding purposes.

Over-Population and High Euthanasia

- Promote the Bureau of Animal Welfare's Responsible Pet Ownership programs.
- Develop a procedure for assessing the suitability of dogs and cats for re-housing.
- Use social media to promote animals available for adoption.

Domestic Animal Businesses

- Audit all Domestic Animal Businesses annually.
- Cross check advertised dogs and cats for sale to determine if the seller is a registered Domestic Animal Business.



CONCLUSION

The draft Domestic Animal Management Plan 2013-17 has been prepared to meet Council's obligations under the Act. It uses a mix of educational and regulatory approaches to facilitate responsible pet ownership and includes a four year action plan.

It contains the follow eight key focus areas:

- Training of Authorised Officers
- Registration and Identification
- Animal Nuisance Complaints
- Dog Attacks
- Dangerous Menacing and Restricted Breed Dogs
- Over-Population and High Euthanasia
- Domestic Animal Businesses
- Municipal Pound

The draft Domestic Animal Management Plan 2013-17 includes a four year action plan with a range of initiatives designed to build on the success of the previous Plan.







Latrobe City Council Draft Domestic Animal Management Plan 2013-2017







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1. INTRODUCTION

The primary focus of this Plan is the management of companion animals, namely dogs and cats. Latrobe City Council acknowledges the role it plays in promoting responsible pet ownership and enforcing legislation. We are committed to balancing the needs of pet owners with those in our community who do not own pets. Consideration has been given to both parties in the development of our Domestic Animal Management Plan 2013-2017.

This Plan has been developed in accordance with Section 68A of the *Domestic Animals Act 1994* and sets out a formalised approach to increase the awareness of domestic animal management practices within Latrobe City.

Latrobe City Council recognises the value domestic pets contribute in making Latrobe City a vibrant and liveable City. Domestic pets are not only considered part of a family, but are an integral part of a wider community. Research demonstrates that pets contribute to building a strong sense of community and developing active social capital; vital to any vibrant, healthy community.

Pet ownership is positively associated with social interactions, community involvement and increased feelings of neighbourhood friendliness and sense of community.

With about 63 percent of Australians owning a dog or cat, these benefits, when aggregated across the whole community, are of significant interest to Council and others concerned with building healthier, happier neighbourhoods.

In addition, these benefits create a ripple effect that extends beyond pet owners into the broader community, with pets helping to smooth the way for social interaction and general 'out and about-ness'.

Both anecdote and research suggests that pets are well recognised ice-breakers. Dogs, for example, can stimulate conversation and contact between strangers and trigger positive social interaction.

Studies undertaken by the School of Population Health at the University of Western Australia showed that half of all dog owners surveyed indicated that they had come to know locals in their suburb as a result of their dog.

Residents' chatting to each other as a result of a pet is not just a social nicety. Such community-based interactions between people have the very real potential to break down the barriers and stereotypes that separate us from 'others' while playing an important role in building trust and a deep sense of community at the neighbourhood level.

Pets provide increased opportunities for families to be more active; companionship to those who may be feeling isolated or lonely and assist people with a disability or illness to maintain independence and participate more fully in community life.





2. BACKGROUND

Local Government has long been the level of government primarily responsible for domestic animal management.

Section 68A of the *Domestic Animal Act 1994* (the Act) requires all Victorian councils to prepare a Domestic Animal Management Plan (the Plan) at four yearly intervals. A copy of the plan and any subsequent amendments must be provided to the Secretary of the Department of Primary Industries. Council is required to then report on the plans implementation in its annual report.

2.1 Primary objective

The primary objective of the Plan is to provide a strategic map to support the community towards the goal of responsible pet ownership and to assist Council in achieving a professional, consistent and proactive approach to domestic animal management practices.

The Plan identifies current activities and future actions to address the following areas, as required by Section 68A of the Act:-

- ≠ Identify methods for evaluating animal control services;
- ≠ Promote responsible pet ownership;
- ≠ Ensure compliance with the Domestic Animals Act 1994 and Regulations;
- ✓ Minimise the risk of dog attacks;
- ✓ Address over population and high euthanasia rates for dogs and cats;
- ≠ Encourage registration and identification of dogs and cats;
- ≠ Minimise the potential for nuisance;
- ≠ Identify dangerous, menacing and restricted breed dogs;
- ≠ Review all existing Council orders and local laws that relate to dogs and cats;
- ≠ Identify programs for training of authorised animal management officers;
- \neq Provide for the periodic evaluation of programs and service strategies.



3. STRATEGIC DIRECTION

- \neq The belief that pets contribute to quality of life.
- \neq A requirement to balance the needs of those who own pets and those who do not.
- ✓ Valuing responsible pet ownership.
- ≠ Proactive animal management and education within the community.
- ≠ Protection of the environment from any negative impacts of dogs and cats.
- ≠ Working in partnership with others to achieve positive outcomes for the community.
- ≠ Local Government plays a leadership role in animal management.

4. LATROBE CITY SNAPSHOT

Latrobe City, Victoria's only regional city situated in the eastern part of the state, encompasses an area of 1,422 square kilometres with a population of approximately 75,000.

Situated approximately 150kms east of Melbourne, in the centre of Gippsland and the Latrobe Valley, Latrobe City is one of four Victorian regional cities.

Latrobe City includes the four major towns of Churchill, Moe/Newborough, Morwell and Traralgon as well as the seven outer lying townships of Boolarra, Glengarry, Toongabbie, Traralgon South, Tyers, Yallourn North and Yinnar.

During the 2011/12 registration period there were 11,667 dogs and 3,518 cats registered within the municipality. There are 12 registered domestic animal businesses, including two pet shops, four boarding establishments and six breeding and rearing establishments.

5. CURRENT PROGRAMS AND SERVICE LEVELS

Latrobe City's Local Laws Team administers and provides a broad range of services to ensure that Council meets its legislative responsibilities relating to the management of domestic animals. They include but are not limited to:


- ≠ Educating residents and promoting responsible pet ownership.
- ✓ Management of Council's domestic animal pound facility.
- ≠ Maintaining a domestic animal register.
- ≠ Providing advice on domestic animal matters.
- ≠ Dealing with and investigating animal complaints for the community.
- ≠ Impounding of wandering, unwanted/surrendered and/or feral dogs and cats.



- ✓ Undertaking registration door knocks.
- ✓ Administration and control of Dangerous and Restricted Breed dogs for compliance with legislation.
- ≠ Investigating dog attacks.
- ≠ Providing a 24 hour 7 day a week emergency service.
- ≠ Inspection and registration of domestic animal businesses.
- Developing and maintaining partnerships with organisations such as Save-a-dog scheme (SADS), Forever Friends Animal Rescue (FFAR) and veterinarians.

5.1 Resourcing

The Local Laws team consists of five full-time and four part-time Local Laws Officers delivering general local laws, animal and parking management services.

5.3 Council Requirements

Latrobe City Council has the following Orders, Local Laws and Procedures currently in place to assist in the effective management of dogs and cats. Council's Local Laws No. 2 is currently under review and may result in changes to the following.

Council Orders

- ✓ Compulsory desexing of all dogs and cats registered for the first time (unless member of applicable organisation or registered as Domestic Animal Business or upon veterinary advice) effective from 10 April 2008.
- ✓ Compulsory microchipping of all dogs and cats registered effective from 10 April 2009.
- \neq Cat curfew 9 pm to 6 am, seven days a week.

Local Law No. 2 - Part 11 Keeping of Animals

147. Dogs (Including Unleashed Dogs)

- 147.1 In regards to property within the Municipal District and zoned Residential, an owner or occupier of that property must not keep or allow to be kept more than two adult dogs (save and except for additional dogs allowed pursuant to a valid planning permit) on any one property without a written permit from the Council under this Part.
- 147.2 In regards to property within the Municipal District and zoned Rural an owner or occupier of property must not keep or allow to be kept more than three adult dogs (save and except for additional dogs allowed pursuant to a valid planning permit) on any one property without a written permit from the Council under this Part.
- 147.3 For the purpose of this part, Rural means any land zoned Rural Land in the Planning Scheme which is not within 50 metres of another zone.
- 147.4 The Council may from time to time designate areas on which dogs may be unleashed provided they remain under the effective control of the owner or person in charge of the dog.
- 147.5 Any person may make a submission under Section 223 of the Act in respect of any action of the Council under sub-clause (4).
- 147.6 A person who unleashes a dog in a designated area must keep the dog under effective control.
- 147.7 A person who unleashes a dog in a designated area bears responsibility for any action of that dog.
- 147.8 The Council must cause areas designated under sub-clause (4) to be signposted for the purpose.
- 147.9 The signposting may include the words "Dog Area unleashing permitted owner liability applies" or words to similar effect.

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147.10 A person must not have a dog unleashed in any built-up area in the Municipal district unless it is in an area designated for that purpose.



147.11 Restricted breed, declared and menacing dogs must not be unleashed and must remain under the effective control of the owner or person in charge of the dog.

148. Permit Application

Any person wishing to keep more than the prescribed number or type of animals on any premises must make application, in writing, to the Council, supplying details of the land involved, the number and type of animals and the care and housing arrangement proposed.

149. Granting of a Permit

In determining whether to grant a Permit, the Council must have regard to any standards of this Local Law and any guidelines determined by Council from time to time.

155. Keeping of Animals

An owner or occupier of property requires a permit to keep or allow to be kept more than 4 different types of animals on any one property at any time and must not keep, without a permit or allow to be kept any more in number for each type of animal than as set out in the table reproduced on page 38 of this document.

156. Litters of Animals

For the purpose of calculating the maximum limit of the numbers of animals kept, the progeny of any dog or cat lawfully kept will be exempt for a period of 12 weeks after their birth.

157. Animal Litter/Dog Excrement

A person in charge of an animal must not allow any part of the animal's excrement to remain on any road, nature strip, reserve or public or Council land. A person in charge of a dog on a road or in a municipal place must:

- (a) not permit the excrement of the dog to remain on that road or in that municipal place;
- (b) carry a device suitable for the removal of any excrement that may be deposited by the dog; and
- (c) produce the device on demand by an authorised officer.

158. Maximum Number of Dogs and Cats

Except as provided in Clause 155, no other property may keep more than five dogs and three cats without a permit.

5.4 Training of Authorised Officers

Latrobe City Council is committed to the training of our Local Laws Officers. An annual training program is developed for each officer to ensure they receive appropriate training. The objective of any training and development is to support all Local Laws staff in having the knowledge and skills necessary to carry out their work.

A training register detailing all qualifications and training courses completed by each Local Laws Officer is maintained and updated annually to reflect any training undertaken or required.

In addition to specialised training, all staff have access to a suite of personal and professional training opportunities delivered through Council's Learning and Development programs.

2008-2012 Domestic Animal Management Plan Highlights:

- ≠ Five Local Laws Officers completed Certificate IV Animal Control.
- Five Local Laws Officers attended regional training seminars sponsored by Bureau of Animal Welfare. Seminars included Identification of Dangerous Dogs, Legislation changes and general updates.
- In-house workshops conducted six monthly to update staff on legislation changes and other matters relevant to the team.
- ≠ Fortnightly team meetings held.
- ≠ Individual Local Laws Staff recognised as:
 - ~ AIAM Animal Management Officer of the Year 2009
 - ~ NAIDOC Achievement Award 2011



5.5 Registration and Identification

Latrobe City Council mails out registration renewal notices prior to 10 April each year.

Any renewal payments not received by the due date of 10 April are followed up with a reminder notice advising of penalties for failing to register a dog or cat.

Registration renewal forms are also used as an opportunity to advertise legislative changes i.e. requirement to register dog/cat by age three months and compulsory microchipping and desexing of all new dogs and cats being registered.

When mailing these notices we often include inserts such as "Doggy Doo" and "Unleashed Areas" pamphlets to further inform and educate our community on domestic animal matters.

New registration applications are available at all Council service centres and libraries in Churchill, Moe, Morwell and Traralgon; via Council's website; through Veterinary Clinics and at Council's pound facility.

Latrobe City currently partners with local contracted veterinarians to run a microchipping week in March where microchipping is offered at the discounted rate.

- Attending properties unannounced to conduct on the spot inspections where there have been ongoing or serious complaints against a property or person.

2008-2012 Domestic Animal Management Plan Highlights:

- ✓ Over ten radio spots regarding responsible pet ownership, microchipping, desexing and registration requirements were conducted on local radio Gippsland FM 104.7.
- ≠ Information caravan visit to Yinnar and Boolarra in March 2010.
- ✓ Compulsory desexing introduced.
- Conducted a discounted microchipping week prior to the registration due date of 10 April each year.
- Implemented Council resolution in relation to compulsory microchipping from April 2009.



5.6 Animal Nuisance Complaints

All animal complaints received are investigated in a timely manner to minimise the potential for complaints escalating. Officers make every effort to resolve complaints to the satisfaction of both parties.

For the most part, nuisance complaints received by Latrobe City Council relate to either barking dogs or stray cats. We recognise barking dog complaints can at times be part of long term neighbourhood disputes which cause great frustration to both parties. Local Laws Officers work hard to balance the interest and rights of both the dog owner and the complainant.

Complainants are first advised to speak directly to their neighbour in an effort to resolve the matter quickly. Often dog owners become desensitised to the sound of their own dog barking and may be unaware it is a nuisance to neighbours.

Council Officers, if involved, will first work with the dog owner to support them in identifying the cause of the barking and suggest possible solutions. The majority of cases involve dogs that are bored or respond to visual stimulation. Both causes are often easily resolved with training, toys, blocking a view or exercising the dog more frequently.

Officers may require complainants to keep noise logs (records of dates, times, duration of barking etc) should the matter continue and further intervention be required.

In response to nuisance complaints received on stray cats; Latrobe City Council offers residents cat cages to assist in containing offending animals trespassing on their property or wandering during the curfew period. Local Laws Officers will then attend during normal business hours and impound any contained cats. These cages are available on payment of a fully refundable deposit.

Educational and/or Promotional Activities

- Make information available at Council service centres and libraries and on Council's website.
- Promote the various resources available to encourage the correct selection of a new pet such as 'Select a Pet' website.
- \neq Provide a wide range of pamphlets.
- Distribute brochures to residents when requested and when investigating complaints.
- \neq Signage to identify the areas designated for exercising dogs off lead.
- ✓ Advertisements in local newspapers and guest spot on local radio.





Compliance Activities

- ≠ Investigate all complaints received.
- Encourage complainants to speak directly to dog owners to alert them to their dog barking.
- ≠ Record all nuisance complaints in Council's record management systems.
- ✓ Provide cat cages to residents for containing trespassing cats as requested.
- ≠ Impound all unregistered dogs found at large.
- ≠ Issue infringements for dogs found at large.
- ≠ Impound or return wandering registered pets to owners.
- Attending properties unannounced to conduct on the spot inspections where there have been ongoing or serious complaints against a property or person.

2008-2012 Domestic Animal Management Plan Highlights:

- \neq A procedure was developed in relation to barking dogs and implemented in 2009.
- ✓ The planned review of dogs and cat provisions in Council's Local Law No. 2 was postponed and will form part of the Local Law No. 2 review to be conducted 2012/2013.





5.7 Dog Attacks

Latrobe City Council considers any reported dog attacks as the highest priority and dispatches a Local Laws Officer immediately to investigate and action as appropriate.

Educational and/or Promotional Activities

- ≠ Promote responsible pet ownership to new and existing dog owners.
- ✓ Promote the benefits of dog training, socialisation and frequent exercise.
- Promote the various resources available to encourage the correct selection of a new pet such as 'Select a Pet' website.
- ✓ Provide a range of pamphlets that raise awareness of the risk of dog attacks in the home, on the street and in parks which include information on how to reduce risks.
- Distribute brochures to residents when requested and when investigating complaints.
- Promotion of the need for dogs to be under effective control, at all times, including the need to ensure dogs can be effectively contained and/or fenced on their own property to ensure they cannot escape.
- ≠ Promote desexing of dogs to reduce aggressive tendencies and wandering at large.
- \neq Promote the need for supervision of children when dogs are present.
- Promote Council's emergency 24 hour 7 day a week service for reporting a dog attack.

Compliance Activities

- ≠ Declaring of all identified dangerous/menacing dogs inline with the *Domestic* Animals Act 1994.
- Respond to all reported dog attacks immediately as the top priority for Local Laws Officers.
- ≠ Record all reported dog attacks in Council's record management systems.
- Ensure all reported dog attacks are thoroughly investigated with findings and evidence accurately recorded and maintained.
- Ensure owners of declared dogs are fully informed of their requirements under the Act.
- ≠ Be proactive in declaring dogs dangerous or menacing.
- Ensure unclaimed dogs at the pound are temperament tested to determine whether they are suitable for re-housing.

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- ✓ Seize dogs involved in serious attacks.
- ≠ Providing an emergency 24 hour 7 day a week service to report a dog attack.



✓ Conduct regular patrols at locations where there is a high incidence of wandering dogs.

2008-2012 Domestic Animal Management Plan Highlights:

- ✓ All investigations of dog attacks finalised.
- ✓ Increased community awareness as a result of the death of a child in Melbourne attacked by a dog and the ensuing media resulted in an increased public awareness of dog risks.

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5.8 Dangerous, Menacing and Restricted Breed Dogs

Latrobe City Council Local Laws Officers investigate any reports or complaints regarding dangerous, menacing or restricted breed dogs, immediately.

Local Laws Officers currently use the Department of Primary Industry 'Standard for Restricted Breed Dogs in Victoria' to identify restricted breeds.

Council Orders

Latrobe City Council currently utilises the *Domestic Animals Act 1994* in relation to dangerous, menacing and restricted breed dogs.

Reports of suspected undeclared restricted breed dogs are rare in Latrobe City. Officers believe there is a high level of compliance regarding the ownership and management of declared dogs within the municipality.

Educational and/or Promotional Activities

- ≠ Media releases in local papers from Council and the Bureau of Animal Welfare.
- ≠ Radio spots on local radio.
- ≠ Information pamphlets at all Council service centres and libraries.
- ≠ Information available on council's website.
- ✓ Ensuring all owners of declared dogs are aware of their obligations under the Act regarding identification and the keeping of these dogs.
- ≠ Promotion of new regulations for restricted breed dogs.
- ≠ Promote the 'Dangerous Dogs Hotline' 1300 101 080 on Council's website.

Compliance Activities

- Ensure that all Declared Dangerous, Menacing and Restricted Breed dogs are registered accurately with the Victorian Declared Dog Registry.
- Inspect commercial and industrial areas to identify guard dogs guarding nonresidential properties.
- Attending properties unannounced to conduct on the spot inspections and annual audits where there are registered declared dogs.
- ≠ Follow-up non-compliance issues found during inspections and audits.
- Review all dog attack cases to determine if it is appropriate to declare the dog dangerous or menacing.
- Maintain a register of all declared dogs registered and housed in Latrobe City Council.
- ≠ Seize unregistered, suspected Restricted Breed dogs.



≠ Complete investigations of complaints of these types of dog breed.

2008-2012 Domestic Animal Management Plan Highlights:

- \neq Audited properties where there are registered declared dogs.
- ✓ Declared Dangerous, Menacing and Restricted Breed dogs registered accurately with the Victorian Declared Dog Registry.





5.9 Over-Population and High Euthanasia

Latrobe City Council is aware of the high euthanasia rates for dogs and in particular cats and continues to promote the benefits of desexing. The introduction of compulsory desexing for all dogs and cats registered for the first time or released from the pound facility was implemented in 2008. Council continues to facilitate a discounted microchipping week prior to the registration date of 10 April each year.

Council has in place two Section 84Y Domestic Animal Act agreements to re-house dogs and cats that have ended up in the pound, and is currently negotiating with several other local organisations.

Educational and/or Promotional Activities

- ≠ Promote responsible pet ownership to new and existing dog owners.
- ≠ Promote the benefits of dog training, socialisation and frequent exercise.
- Promote the various resources available to encourage the correct selection of a new pet such as 'Select a Pet' website.
- ≠ Promote Council's cat curfew.
- Promote the benefits of desexing; such as no surprise litters, fewer unwanted animals in the community, fewer animals euthanised, reduced aggression and reduced wandering, via local radio spots, local newspaper articles and on Council's website.
- ✓ Select a "Pet of the week" and advertise in local newspaper, on Council's website and via social media.
- ✓ Offer dogs and cats for sale from the pound at an affordable price which includes desexing and microchipping costs.

Compliance Activities

- Investigating complaints and reports of numbers of dogs/cats on residential properties.
- \neq Provide cat cages to residents for containing trespassing cats as requested.
- Investigate reports of animal hoarding and work with owners to reduce these to permitted numbers.
- ≠ Enter into Section 84Y Domestic Animal Act agreements with local organisations to re-house dogs and cats that have ended up in the pound.
- ✓ Investigate reports of unauthorised 'backyard breeders' to ascertain whether they should be registered as a domestic animal business.
- ≠ Where identified facilitate cat trapping programs of industry/commercial businesses.

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✓ Implementation of Council resolution for the desexing of all dogs and cats being registered for the first time from April 2008.

2008-2012 Domestic Animal Management Plan Highlights:

- ≠ Enter into two Section 84Y Domestic Animal Act agreements with local organisations to re-house dogs and cats that have ended up in the pound.
- \neq Re-housed 100% of 'Pet of the week' animals.





5.10 Domestic Animal Businesses

Latrobe City Council currently has 12 registered Domestic Animal Businesses. These businesses are issued with registration renewal notices each year and Council conducts annual inspections in relation to their compliance with relevant codes of practices.

Council provides all registered Domestic Animal Businesses with any changes to the legislation or Code of Practice information relevant to the business and encourage business owners to be involved in any review of the mandatory Code of Practice.

Latrobe City Council sponsored a seminar for all registered Domestic Animal Businesses to network and remain relevant in relation to changes in legislation. In addition this seminar provided a forum for discussion and information sharing.

Any new registration applications are received and processed inline with the Code of Practice.

Educational and/or Promotional Activities

- Provide relevant mandatory Code of Practice to proprietors of existing and proposed domestic animal businesses.
- ≠ Ensure all relevant Domestic Animal Businesses are advised and involved in any review of the mandatory Code of Practice for their type of business.
- ✓ Sponsors an annual seminar for all registered Animal Businesses to network and remain relevant in relation to changes in legislation.
- Invite Domestic Animal Businesses to be involved in Council's animal related community events.

Compliance Activities

- Conduct web, 'Yellow Pages', newspaper, Dogzonline.com.au, etc, searches to ascertain whether there are unregistered Domestic Animal Businesses within the municipality.
- Conduct annual (or more frequent) 'unscheduled' inspections/audits of each Domestic Animal Business premises to determine compliance with the Act, relevant mandatory Code of Practice, and any terms, conditions, limitations or restrictions on that registration.
- ≠ Use audit documents on Bureau of Animal Welfare's Animal Management website.
- Follow-up Domestic Animal Business non-compliance issues with information on required actions and timeframe for resolution, further inspections, and prosecutions where necessary.

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 \neq In the case of serious non-compliance issues, suspend or cancel registration.



- Check local newspapers to ensure Domestic Animal Business registration numbers and name of Council that issued that number are included in cat and dog 'for sale' advertisements.
- Liaise with other units within Council to provide advice when planning applications for Domestic Animal Businesses are received, to ensure appropriate conditions are placed on construction, operation, etc.
- Offer a Domestic Animal Business kit to send to people making queries about setting up a Domestic Animal Business, to let them know of all the requirements involved, before they start making too many plans.

2008-2012 Domestic Animal Management Plan Highlights:

A successful Domestic Animal Business workshop for current and prospective proprietors was hosted by Local Laws staff at Latrobe City Corporate Headquarters in April 2010 which was attended by 37 people.





6. 2011-2012 CUSTOMER SATISFACTION SURVEY RESULTS

Stakeholder consultation was undertaken in the form of a survey, which was distributed by mail, available from Council service centres and libraries; online through Council's website and by external agents walking Churchill, Moe, Morwell and Traralgon central business districts between 23 November 2011 and 31 January 2012.

A total of 354 completed surveys were received. Responses from this survey have been collated and samples of those responses are presented as follows:

- \neq 75% of cat owners surveyed had registered their cats.
- \neq 87.5% of cat owners surveyed had desexed their cats.
- \neq 63.8% of surveyed respondents were aware of our 9 pm-6 am cat curfew.
- \neq 86.4% of surveyed respondents agreed with the cat curfew.
- ≠ 54% of surveyed respondents believed there is no problem with stray cats in their area.
- \neq 70% of surveyed respondents agreed with compulsory desexing of cats.
- ≠ 51.9% of surveyed respondents are aware we have cat cages for hire.
- \neq 87.4% of dog owners surveyed had registered their dogs.
- \neq 66.8 of dog owners surveyed had desexed their dogs.
- \neq 52.2% of dog owners surveyed have taken their dogs to obedience training.
- ≠ 74.5% of surveyed respondents believe there is no problem with stray dogs in their area.
- \neq 45.4% of surveyed respondents agreed with compulsory desexing of dogs.
- ≠ 90.1% of surveyed respondents were aware of the Local Law requiring owners to pick up dog droppings.
- ≠ 71.7% of surveyed respondents believed there is no problem with dog droppings in their area.
- ≠ 42% of surveyed respondents were aware we offered a discounted microchipping week.
- ≠ 80% of respondents who have visited our pound rate the assistance of staff good to excellent.
- \neq 62.1% of surveyed respondents support the current pound operating times.

The purpose of this report is to seek endorsement from Council to proceed with a community engagement process to inform the development of an Expression of Interest for funding through the State Government's *Putting Locals First Program* for redevelopment of the former Moe Early Learning Centre as a centre for community organisations.

BACKGROUND

Latrobe City Council acquired the former Moe Early Learning Centre (MELC) at 38 Fowler Street in 2003 when the private childcare centre which had operated for 37 years went into liquidation. Council assumed ongoing responsibility for management of the service, which was relocated to Moe PLACE in 2012 as part of the Moe Southside Community Precinct.

On 5 December 2011, Council considered the proposed sale of the former MELC (attachment 1) and resolved as follows:

- 1. That Council, in accordance with Section 189 of the Local Government Act 1989 and Sale of Council Owned Property Policy, gives public notice of its intention to consider the sale of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe.
- 2. That Council, in accordance with the Sale of Council Owned Property Policy, invites public comment on whether the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe, is surplus to community requirements.
- 3. That pursuant to Section 223 of the Local Government Act 1989 Council considers any submissions received in relation to the potential sale of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe, at the Ordinary Council Meeting to be held on Monday 6 February 2012.

In accordance with the decision of Council, officers arranged the public notification and a further report (attachment 2) was presented to Council on 6 February 2012. At this meeting Council resolved as follows:

- 1. That Council, having considered the written submissions received regarding the sale of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe, and in accordance with the Sale of Council Owned Property Policy, forms the opinion that the former Moe Early Learning Centre is surplus to both community and Council requirements.
- 2. That, pursuant to Section 189 of the Local Government Act 1989, Council resolves to sell the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe, being the land contained in Certificate of Title Volume 8654 Folio 639 and described as Lot 1 on Title Plan 549920F, to Latrobe Health Services by private treaty.
- 3. That Council obtain a current valuation in accordance with Section 189 of the Local Government Act 1989.
- 4. That Council authorises the Chief Executive Officer to enter into a Contract of Sale and, when prepared, sign and seal a Transfer of Land document allowing the transfer of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe.

5. That all submitters by advised of Councils decision in relation to the sale of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe.

At the Council Meeting of 5 March (attachment 3) Council resolved as following;

That the final report regarding the proposed sale of the former Moe Early Learning and Care Centre be presented at a future council meeting, prior to June 2012.

An additional submission regarding the use and potential purchase of the site was later received from Latrobe Community Health Services. All these elements and a range of options were then considered by Council on 4 June 2012 (attachment 4).

At its meeting of 4 June 2012 Council resolved as follows:

- 1. That Council, having considered the written submissions received regarding the sale of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe, and in accordance with the Sale of Council Owned Property Policy, forms the opinion that the former Moe Early Learning Centre is surplus to both community and Council requirements.
- 2. That, pursuant to Section 189 of the Local Government Act 1989, Council resolves to sell the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe, being the land contained in Certificate of Title Volume 8654 Folio 639 and described as Lot 1 on Title Plan 549920F, to Latrobe Health Services by private treaty.
- 3. That Council obtain a current valuation in accordance with Section 189 of the Local Government Act 1989.
- 4. That Council authorises the Chief Executive Officer to enter into a Contract of Sale and, when prepared, sign and seal a Transfer of Land document allowing the transfer of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe.
- 5. That all submitters by advised of Councils decision in relation to the sale of the former Moe Early Learning Centre at 38 Fowler Street, Moe.

An update report at the Council meeting of 3 December 2012 (attachment 5) was prepared as the purchase price offer from Latrobe Community Health Services was below the required 90 percent of the sworn valuation and therefore not able to be accepted by the Chief Executive Officer in accordance with Section 189 of the *Local Government Act 1989*. Based on this and the associated information, Council reconsidered the situation. At the meeting on 3 December 2012 Council resolved as follows:

- 1. That Council retain ownership of 38 Fowler Street, Moe as a community organisation centre providing office accommodation, meeting and storage space in recognition of identified community need.
- 2. That a further valuation be sourced as Council believes the valuation is too low and that \$125,000 is unacceptable.
- 3. That an approach be made to MLA for Narracan, Gary Blackwood, to access funding for refurbishment and that such an approach occur immediately.
- 4. To that effect, that this issue be placed on the agenda of the meeting between Council and parliamentarians to occur on 4 December 2012.

Following the Council resolutions of 3 December 2012, background research has been undertaken to explore potential funding options for realising the objective of turning the building into a centre for community organisations. Discussions have also been held with Gary Blackwood, MLA for Narracan, who has reiterated his support for Council in seeking funding for revitalising the facility for community use.

The valuer has reviewed the valuation of June 2012, the property and prevailing market conditions and advised that the value of property has not altered materially and confirms the valuation of \$125,000.

ISSUES

Exploration of potential funding sources to help realise Council's goal of redeveloping the former MELC as a vibrant centre to support community groups has identified the *Putting Locals First Program* (PLFP), which is a component of the State Government's Regional Growth Fund (RGF), as the most appropriate and relevant funding option.

The PLFP is managed through Regional Development Victoria (RDV) and designed to enable regional communities to devise and deliver service and infrastructure responses which reflect local priorities.

The focus of the program is on:

- improved infrastructure, facilities and services
- increased business and employment opportunities
- improved community connections
- communities taking action on their own behalf.

This project is eligible for funding under the categories of *Improved Local Infrastructure - Grants up to \$500,000* and/or *Local Community Initiatives - Grants up to \$150,000.* The indication from RDV is that the project will fit best under the Improved Local Infrastructure category. This is also largely due to the potential size of the grant Council may be seeking.

Grants are provided to Councils on a \$2: \$1 (\$2 x RDF funding to \$1 x LCC funding) ratio for projects requesting funding of up to \$300,000, and applications may be submitted any time as there is no closing date. For projects requesting funding between \$300,000 and \$500,000, grants are provided on a \$1: \$1 ratio.

It is anticipated that the cost to redevelop the building to enable it to meet long term community needs will be well beyond the initial cost estimate obtained in March 2012 of \$159,000. This quote was based on undertaking minimal works for the building to be utilised as office and meeting space.

The total cost of the project will need to take into account aspects such as furniture and equipment, purchase of new white goods and potential removal of internal asbestos material. The redevelopments of similar sized multi-purpose facilities over recent years in other parts of the municipality suggest the costs are more likely to be in the vicinity of \$400,000.

There is a two stage process for the development of funding applications for the Putting Locals First Program. There is an initial project proposal or Expression of Interest (EoI) stage and then, if supported by the RDV, the detailed development of the proposal. There is normally one month between the submission of the EoI and receiving feedback on whether to proceed with the detailed application, where direct assistance is provided by RDV staff.

If an initial Expression of Interest for funding results in a request by RDV for a full application to be submitted, there is a high likelihood of the project being funded, which will require a funding commitment from Council.

If approved to progress to the second stage or a full application, the requirements include more detailed responses on the five areas outlined below as well as attention to issues such as a governance model, time frames, detailed designs and detailed costings.

A fundamental element to preparing an Expression of Interest is the requirement to undertake an extensive community engagement process, which will include the identification of potential stakeholders. This will be the foundation for developing an Eol.

To be successful, the proposal must demonstrate broad community benefits of the project, and all elements of the proposal will need to be developed with community and stakeholder engagement and input. The proposal needs to clearly identify why the project is needed, what will be achieved, what activities are proposed and who will be involved, ensuring a collaborative approach.

To be eligible and successful, funding proposals must specifically demonstrate:

- evidence of the need for the facility with an assessment of alternative solutions and/or opportunities;
- broad community benefit and why it is needed it is about what happens as a result of co-location, not just about refurbishing the building;
- inclusiveness in involving the community in the planning and implementation stages with extensive community engagement, identifying who is involved;
- that the facilities will be shared multi-purpose and available for multiple users or groups, accessible to the general public and what will be achieved through establishing the facility; and
- sustainability identify who is going to pay the ongoing costs after the building is redeveloped and the contributions of participating organisations and how the development process will occur.

Following the initial community engagement and research phase to identify and establish need, a project steering committee will be required to be established to lead the development of the Expression of Interest. Consideration will also be required of a potential governance model to operate the centre if funding is secured.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

As a former house before being redeveloped to enable it to operate as a child care centre for 37 years, the building has already been modified on several occasions to meet changes to childcare licensing requirements. Building and yard maintenance was reduced in recent years with the knowledge that the service was to be transferred elsewhere in Moe.

Therefore significant works will be required for it to be fit for alternate purposes and to meet current codes of practice and accessibility requirements.

There is currently an allocation of \$30,000 for 2013/14 and \$140,000 in 2014/15 in the draft Capital Works Budget for the redevelopment of the former MELC. This allocation would be used as council's matching funding should we be successful in proceeding to the second stage of seeking a grant. The contribution by Council will be based upon a costing of a detailed concept design for the total project. If the grant required is in the vicinity of \$300,000 for a total project of \$450,000, Council will need to allocate \$150,000 based on the \$2: \$1 ratio.

Grants are provided to Councils on a \$2: \$1 (\$2 x RDF funding to \$1 x LCC funding) ratio for projects requesting funding of up to \$300,000. For projects requesting funding between \$300,000 and \$500,000, grants are provided on a \$1: \$1 ratio.

A further budget consideration, which is outside the scope of the grant, is the ongoing costs for operating a community centre.

The potential for financial and in-kind contributions for each stage of the project, including from potential user groups, has not been determined or assessed, nor has there been any ongoing income sources identified. Securing funding from other sources to contribute to the redevelopment and the ongoing operational costs would be viewed favourably by RDV and help secure a government grant.

INTERNAL/EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

This report has been prepared following discussion with staff from the Gippsland office of Regional Development Victoria. Advice and assistance will be provided by RDV as required to further the process of submitting a funding application based on the requirements outlined in this report.

Contact was also made by telephone with the MLA for Narracan, Gary Blackwood, to seek his support if a funding application was prepared to the State Government. A commitment has been forthcoming from Mr Blackwood to continue to work with the Moe and district community and Council to seek funding to support Council and community objectives.

There has been no further consultation with any other potential external stakeholders.

The next step will be to develop and implement a community engagement plan, working closely with stakeholders.

OPTIONS

Council has the following options available;

To develop and implement a community engagement plan and process to inform a potential Expression of Interest for funding from the State Government's *Putting Locals First Program* to redevelop the former Moe Early Learning Centre as a centre for community organisations, addressing the stated funding criteria.

To not develop and implement a community engagement plan and process to inform a potential Expression of Interest for funding from the State Government's *Putting Locals First* program to redevelop the former Moe Early Learning Centre as a centre for community organisations, addressing the stated funding criteria.

CONCLUSION

Council had previously resolved to sell the former Moe Early Learning Centre. On 3 December 2012 Council resolved to retain ownership of the facility for use as a community organisation centre.

Having resolved to retain the centre for community use, a community engagement process is now required as a means to inform its future uses, identify local needs and potential users. This information is required to enable a potential Expression of Interest for funding for its redevelopment to be submitted to the State Government *Putting Locals First Program*.

The result of the community engagement process will provide Council with important information and a strong basis on which to consider the potential allocation of funding and resources to support the redevelopment of the building and surrounds as a viable community centre.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to determine Council's position regarding Planning Permit Application 2012/184 for a five lot subdivision and creation and removal of easements at Lot 3 on Plan of Subdivision 126470 Bradford Drive, Traralgon.

Council is unable to make a formal decision on the application as the applicant has submitted an Application for Review under section 79 of the *Planning and Environment Act* 1987 to the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) for the failure of Council to determine the matter within the statutory timeframe of 60 days.

However in order for Council to make submissions at VCAT, Council should resolve a 'position'. The purpose of this report is to recommend a position for Council to present at VCAT.

DECLARATION OF INTERESTS

No officer declared an interest under the *Local Government Act* 1989 in the preparation of this report.

STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK

This report is consistent with Latrobe 2026: The Community Vision for Latrobe Valley and the Latrobe City Council Plan 2012-2016.

SUMMARY

Zoning: Low Density Residential Zone

Overlay No overlays affect this property

A Planning Permit is required for subdivision of land in a Low Density Residential Zone in accordance with Clause 32.03-3 of the Scheme. Each lot must be at least 0.4 hectares (4,000 square metres).

A planning permit is required for the creation and removal of easements pursuant to Clause 52.02 Easements, Restrictions and Reserves.

PROPOSAL

It is proposed to subdivide the land into five lots over two stages, create three new easements and remove one easement.

A copy of the proposed plan of subdivision is included as Attachment 1 of this report.

Subdivision

Proposed Lots 1, 2 and 3 would be located at the front of the site and would have frontage to Bradford Drive. Lots 4 and 5 would be located at the rear of the site in a 'battleaxe' configuration, with an 8 metre wide driveway along the eastern boundary providing access to these lots from Bradford Drive.

Lots 1, 2, 4 and 5 would each have an area of 4,000 square metres and Lot 3 would have an area of 4,002 square metres.

Building envelopes and driveway locations have been shown for each lot on the plan included as Attachment 2 of this report.

The building envelopes have been designed in accordance with the constraints of the site which include easements, slope, a waterway, access and drainage.

The lots can be described as follows:

- Lot 1 would be rectangular in shape and would have a frontage of 35.66 metres to Bradford Drive, a depth of 112.18 metres and an overall area of 4,000 square metres. It would have two potential building envelopes separated by an existing 2.0 metre wide sewerage easement located towards the rear of the site. The building envelope to the north of the easement would have an area of 1057 square metres and the building envelope to the south would have an area of 918 square metres, giving a total building envelope area of 1975 square metres. (It is noted that whilst there are two building envelopes the zone only allows for the construction of a single dwelling and ancillary structures without further planning approval.) The building envelopes would be set back 22 metres from the site frontage and 5 metres from the north, east and west boundaries. A 3 metre wide crossover and driveway would be located towards the eastern end of the frontage of the site. An existing tree would be located within the building envelope. An existing drainage easement would run diagonally across the south-western corner of the lot.
- Lot 2 would also be rectangular in shape with the same dimensions as Lot 1. It would also have two building envelopes separated by the existing 2.0 metre wide sewerage easement. The building envelope to the north of the easement would have an area of 494 square metres and the building envelope to the south would have an area of 1175 square metres, giving a total building envelope area of 1669 square metres. (Again as above, only one dwelling is permitted to be constructed on the lot under the current zoning of the land without further planning approval.) The building envelopes would be set back 33 metres from the site frontage and 5 metres from the north, east and west boundaries. A 3 metre wide driveway would be accessed via a 6.0 metre wide crossover to be shared with proposed Lot 3 located in the south-western corner of the site. The existing 10 metre wide drainage easement would run diagonally across the frontage of the lot.
- Lot 3 would be triangular in shape and would have a frontage of 60.68 metres, a depth of 122.13 metres, and an overall area of 4,002 square metres. It would have a building envelope of 769 square metres set back 45 metres from the site frontage. The envelope would be set back 5 metres from the east and west boundaries and approximately 11 metres from the northern boundary. A 3 metre wide driveway would be accessed via a 6.0 metre wide crossover to be shared with proposed Lot 2 located in the south-eastern corner of the site.

The existing 10 metre wide drainage easement would run diagonally across the frontage of the lot, an existing 5 metre wide drainage easement would run partly along the western boundary, and a 2.0 metre wide sewerage easement would dissect the northern end of the site.

- Lot 4 would be a battleaxe shaped lot which would share access to Bradford Drive with Lot 5. The main body of Lot 4 would be rectangular in shape and would be 81.99 metres long by 51.21 metres wide, with an area of 4,000 square metres. A building envelope of 2,409 square metres would be set back 5 metres from each lot boundary and would cover the majority of the site. A 4 metre wide driveway would provide access to the site. The driveway would be shared with Lot 5 and would be constructed within an 8 metre wide 'axe handle', 4 metres of which would make up part of Lot 4, and 4 metres would make up part of Lot 5. The lots would have access rights over the portion of the driveway that is not on their title resulting in an 8 metre wide driveway area. The driveway would be accessed by a 6 mere wide double crossover located at the eastern end of the site. Lot 4 would not be encumbered with any existing easements. An easement of way in favour of Lot 5 would cover the driveway.
- Lot 5 would be located at the rear of the site and would have a width of 70 metres, a length of 52.29 metres, and an overall area of 4,000 square metres. A building envelope of 2,248 square metres would be set back 5 metres from all boundaries. The vehicle access arrangements are the same as described for Lot 4. There are no existing easements that would encumber the lot. The driveway is proposed to be an easement of way in favour of Lot 4.

Each lot would be connected to reticulated sewerage, water, gas, electricity and telecommunications.

Easements

It is proposed to remove the easement of drainage and way located on the western boundary in the south-western corner of the site. The easement is known as E-6 on Lodged Plan 126470. The easement is 5 metres wide and 60 metres long and was created to provide shared access to the subject site and the adjoining property to the west of the site, as well as to house drainage assets. A new drainage easement (A-1/E-4) which would be the same size and in the same location is proposed to be created to replace E-6. It would be located on proposed Lot 3 and the adjoining property to the west.

Two further easements are also proposed to be created. They are the easements of way over Lots 4 and 5 which will allow for the creation of an 8 metre wide shared driveway area within these lots. They are shown as E-6 and E-7 on the Proposed Building Envelope and Driveway Plan attached. It is noted that the actual driveway would have a width of 4 metres.

Staging

It is proposed to construct the subdivision in two stages, with Stage 1 creating Lots 1, 2 and 3 and 'super lot' Lot S2. Lot S2 would be subsequently developed as part of Stage 2 and would create Lots 4 and 5.

A copy of the Staging Plan is included as Attachment 3.

Subject Land:

The subject site is regular in shape and is located on the northern side of Bradford Drive in Traralgon. It has a frontage of 140 metres to Bradford Road, a depth of 230.4 metres and an overall area of 2.0 hectares. The rear boundary is 52.16 metres wide and has frontage to Coopers Road which is an unmade government road reserve.

The site has a gradual slope from the north-east (rear) to south-west (front) of 12 metres. A declared watercourse runs east-west across the southern end of the site.

The site is currently vacant with the only structure on the site being stockyards located in the south-eastern corner. The site has been cleared of all remnant native vegetation with the exception of one tree located in the middle of the site towards the eastern boundary. The remainder of the site has been sown with pasture grass.

The site is serviced by underground reticulated sewerage, water, gas, electricity and telecommunications. Easements on the site are as follows:

- E-2 sewerage easement that runs diagonally through the middle of the site and along the eastern boundary at its southern end. The easement is 2 metres wide and widens to 5 metres along the boundary.
- E-3 drainage easement that runs diagonally across the southern section of the site over the designated waterway. The easement is 10 metres wide.
- E-4 easement of way and drainage that runs along the southern end of the western boundary and is located on the subject site and the adjoining property to the west. The easement is 5 metres wide on the subject site.

Surrounding Land Use:

Directly to the north of the site is Coopers Road which is an unmade government road. The reserve is currently grassed and not used for access. This road is identified in Traralgon Growth Areas Review (TGAR) as a future pedestrian/cycling share path. Land further north is in the Low Density Residential Zone and has been developed for low density residential purposes on Regan Road. Lots vary in size from 4,000 square metres to 4 hectares.

Land to the south is located in a Special Use Zone – Urban Gateway. These properties generally have frontage to Princes Highway via a service road and comprise car and caravan sales uses. The site directly opposite the subject site is currently vacant and has frontage to both Bradford Drive and Princes Highway.

Land to the west, No. 15 Bradford Drive, is 2 hectares in size and is in the Low Density Residential Zone. It is developed with a large dwelling, outbuildings and swimming pool at the northern end, and a large ornamental lake at the southern end which a designated watercourse runs into. The remainder of the site consists of a cultivated garden. Access to the site is via a crossover and driveway from Bradford Drive. The site also has frontage to Coopers Road but as this road is unmade, there is no established access to it.

Land to the east, No. 35 Bradford Drive, is 2 hectares and is also in the Low Density Residential Zone. It has been developed with a substantial dwelling and outbuilding in the rear northern part of the site, with the remainder of the site comprised of pasture and a dam. Access to the site is via a crossover and driveway from Bradford Drive. This site also has frontage to Coopers Road but has no access to it.

HISTORY OF APPLICATION

The history of the assessment of the planning permit application is set out in Attachment 5.

The provisions of the scheme that are relevant to the subject application have been included in Attachment 6.

LATROBE PLANNING SCHEME

State Planning Policy Framework

The proposal has been considered against the relevant clauses under the State Planning Policy Framework.

The objective of Clause 11.02-1 is to ensure a sufficient supply of land is available for, among other things, residential uses.

Strategies to achieve this include

- Ensure that sufficient land is available to meet forecast demand.
- Plan to accommodate projected population growth over at least a 15 year period and provide clear direction on locations where growth should occur.
- Restrict low-density rural residential development that would compromise future development at higher densities.

The objective of Clause 11.05-1 Regional settlement networks is "to promote the sustainable growth and development of regional Victoria through a network of settlements identified in the Regional Victoria Settlement Framework plan".

The Moe, Morwell and Traralgon cluster has been identified in the Regional Victoria Settlement Framework plan as one of the regional areas where urban growth should be directed.

Networks of high-quality settlements should be delivered by:

- Building on strengths and capabilities of each region across Victoria to respond sustainably to population growth and changing environments.
- Balancing strategic objectives to achieve improved land-use and development outcomes at a regional, catchment and local level.
- Preserving and protecting features of rural land and natural resources and features to enhance their contribution to settlements and landscapes.
- Providing for appropriately located supplies of residential, commercial, and industrial land across a region, sufficient to meet community needs.

Clause 11.05-4 Regional planning strategies and principles states that Victoria's regional areas should be developed with a strong identity, be prosperous and environmentally sustainable. The growth and development of distinctive and diverse regional settlements should be encouraged. This can be achieved by, among other things, ensuring that the potential of land that may be required for future urban expansion is not compromised.

Clause 14.02-1 Catchment Planning and Management deals with the management of water. Its objective is "to assist the protection and, where possible, restoration of catchments, waterways, water bodies, groundwater, and the marine environment".

The relevant objectives of this clause are:

- Retain natural drainage corridors with vegetated buffer zones at least 30m wide along each side of a waterway to maintain the natural drainage function, stream habitat and wildlife corridors and landscape values, to minimise erosion of stream banks and verges and to reduce polluted surface runoff from adjacent land uses
- Undertake measures to minimise the quantity and retard the flow of stormwater runoff from developed areas.
- Encourage measures to filter sediment and wastes from stormwater prior to its discharge into waterways, including the preservation of floodplain or other land for wetlands and retention basins.
- Ensure that works at or near waterways provide for the protection and enhancement of the environmental qualities of waterways and their instream uses.

 Ensure planning is coordinated with the activities of catchment management authorities.

Clause 19.03-2 refers to the provision of water supply, sewerage and drainage. The objective of this clause is "to plan for the provision of water supply, sewerage and drainage services that efficiently and effectively meet State and community needs and protect the environment".

Clause 19.03-3 Stormwater aims to reduce the impact of stormwater on bays and catchments.

To achieve this, water-sensitive urban design techniques should be incorporated into developments to:

- Protect and enhance natural water systems.
- Integrate stormwater treatment into the landscape.
- Protect quality of water.
- Reduce run-off and peak flows.
- Minimise drainage and infrastructure costs.

Local Planning Policy Framework

The subject site is in a Low Density Residential Zone located to the west of the main urban area of Traralgon. The objective of Clause 21.04 Rural Living is to identify appropriate locations for rural residential living. A strategy associated with this objective is to *"discourage further rural living or low density residential development on the fringes of the major towns where land is designated as a long-term urban growth corridor".*

Traralgon West Interim Infrastructure Development Policy (TW Interim Policy) 11 POL-2

Pursuant to Section 60(1A)(g) of the Act, before deciding on an application, the responsible authority, if the circumstances appear to so require, may consider any other strategic plan, policy statement, code or guideline which has been adopted by a Minister, government department, public authority or municipal council.

In this case, the Traralgon West Interim Infrastructure Development Policy (TW Interim Policy) 11 POL-2 is applicable.

The TW Interim Policy applies to approximately 180 hectares of Low Density Residential zoned land to the west of Traralgon (or known as Traralgon West Low Density Residential Precinct). The subject site falls within this precinct.

This policy, adopted by Council on 7 February 2011, outlines the process by which Latrobe City Council will consider further subdivision of land within the Traralgon Low Density Residential Precinct, pending:

- Resolution and construction of agreed road and stormwater infrastructure services to be provided for the precinct;
- Mitigation of potential detriment to downstream landholders resulting from increased stormwater volumes;
- Establishment of an appropriate framework to assure the equitable distribution and sequencing of landowner financial contributions to agreed road and stormwater infrastructure services;
- Resolution of opportunities for the immediate and long term provision of medium density residential development within the LDRZ precinct.

Before deciding on an application to subdivide land, the responsible authority must also consider:

- The directions of this policy [TW Interim Policy];
- The State Planning Policy Framework and the Local Planning Policy Framework, including the Municipal Strategic Statement and local planning policies;
- The Decision Guidelines provided by the Latrobe Planning Scheme at Clause 32.03-3 and Clause 65;
- The need to prevent the subdivision of land which may compromise future opportunities for future residential development within the precinct;
- Whether the proposal will result in increased stormwater volumes being generated and whether this is likely to have an adverse impact on other property';
- Whether a stormwater management plan has been submitted and that the plan is to the satisfaction of the responsible authority;
- Whether each proposed lot has a legal point of vehicle access via a government road;
- Consideration of any management plan or infrastructure contribution scheme being prepared for the precinct; and
- The need to include a condition requiring specified works or services to be provided or paid for in accordance with an agreement under Section 173 of the Planning and Environment Act 1987. The 173 Agreement is to be prepared to ensure:
 - (a) present and future landowner awareness of the possible higher density residential development occurring within the Traralgon LDRZ precinct; and
 - (b) Financial contributions are provided for the provision of future stormwater and road infrastructure within the Traralgon LDRZ precinct.

Traralgon Growth Area Review (TGAR) and Draft Traralgon West Structure Plan

TGAR is intended to provide a growth strategy that identifies areas for future urban development around Traralgon, Traralgon-Morwell Corridor, Glengarry and Tyers up to the year 2051. The subject site is within the study area of TGAR.

The Traralgon Framework Plan and the Traralgon West Structure Plan form part of the draft TGAR documents.

Draft Traralgon Framework Plan

The Draft Traralgon Framework Plan places the subject land in Area 14 where land is identified as suitable for being progressively rezoned and redeveloped in the future to provide further conventional residential land for Traralgon. The Framework Plan states that, as a priority, increased residential densities should be sought for the land in Area 14.

Draft Traralgon West Structure Plan

The draft Traralgon West Structure Plan shows the site within Area 6. Information regarding Area 6 in the Plan is as follows:

"Existing Low Density Residential and Rural Living zoned land in the south of the precinct...should intensify through development at conventional residential densities. A Development Plan should be prepared for the identified areas in collaboration with the existing landowners to ensure that appropriate connections and infrastructure is established as densities increases."

Council officers are currently considering submissions to the public exhibition of TGAR. TGAR has not been adopted by Council at this stage.

Zoning

The subject site is located within the Low Density Residential Zone. The primary purpose of the zone is 'to provide for low-density residential development on lots which, in the absence of reticulated sewerage, can treat and retain all wastewater'. In accordance with the LDRZ provisions, a permit is required to subdivide land and each of the proposed lots must be at least 0.4 hectare. The proposed subdivision satisfies this requirement with all lots proposed to be 0.4 hectares or greater in size.

In accordance with Clause 32.03-3 of the Scheme, Council must consider the relevant decision guidelines of the LDRZ. A discussion of the decision guidelines is in the Issues section of this report.

Particular Provisions

Clause 52.01 Public Open Space Contribution and Subdivision:

Council's Public Open Space Strategy requires a contribution from the developer of 10% of the value of the net developable area of the land to be provided in either cash or land or a combination of both for public open space. In this instance, a cash contribution of 10% would be required in accordance with the Strategy as the size and location of the subject site does not meet the requirements of the Strategy with regard to the provision of land.

Clause 52.02 Easements, Restrictions and Reserves:

It is proposed to remove an easement of way and drainage and replace it with a drainage easement. These easements also affect the adjoining property to the west of the site which is in the same ownership as the subject site. As the easement of way is no longer required for access to the subject site or adjoining property its removal is considered to be acceptable. The drainage easement to be created will replicate the existing easement. As such, Council's Infrastructure Planning team has no objection to its removal and replacement.

Two further easements of way are proposed which would allow for access to Lots 4 and 5 in a battleaxe arrangement. The creation of these easements is not considered to be acceptable as the subdivision as a whole is not considered to be appropriate for the site and the surrounding area. This will be discussed further in the Issues section of this report.

Decision Guidelines (Clause 65):

Clause 65.02 provides decision guidelines to consider when assessing applications to subdivide land. These guidelines are discussed in the Issues section of this report.

ISSUES

Strategic direction of the State and Local Planning Policy Frameworks:

The State and Local Planning Policy Frameworks acknowledge the need to protect land on the outskirts of established urban areas in the event that it may be required for future growth of a town. In particular, Clause 11.02-1 of the Scheme aims to restrict low density rural residential development that would compromise future development at higher densities. Clause 21.04-3 of the Scheme generally discourages further rural living or low density residential development on the fringes of the major towns where land is designated as a long-term urban growth corridor.

In addition, Council's draft Traralgon Growth Area Review report and draft Traralgon West Structure Plan have identified that there are some significant constraints associated with future residential development of Traralgon. In particular, the floodplain associated with Latrobe River located to the north of the town, the proposed Traralgon bypass to the south of the town, and the airfield and Australian Paper amenity buffer further to the west of the town restrict the ability for growth in these directions. Areas to the east and directly to the west of Traralgon (including the subject land) therefore represent opportunities for future growth for the town, and ad-hoc subdivisions should be avoided to provide maximum opportunity for future residential development.

The subject land has been identified as being located within a 'proposed conventional residential' area, in accordance with Council's draft Traralgon West Structure Plan. The 'Proposed Zoning' plan shows the land as 'proposed Residential 1 Zone'.

The subdivision that is the subject of this report would provide low density residential lots and would restrict the potential for a higher density lot yield from this site in the future. This is contrary to the State and Local Planning Policy Frameworks which discourages further low density residential development on the fringes of major towns where land has been identified for future residential growth.

TW Interim Policy

The proposal has been assessed against the TW Interim Policy and found to not comply on the following grounds:

- The proposal would result in the subdivision of land which would compromise future opportunities for residential development within the precinct.
- The proposal would result in increased stormwater volumes being generated which may have an adverse impact on other properties. The applicant was requested to provide a stormwater management plan for the site but they declined to do so. As such, the impact of the flow of stormwater from the subdivision is unable to be assessed.

On the above basis, it is considered that the proposal to create five additional lots will result in a long term detrimental impact on potential future residential growth of Traralgon, given the existing development constraints around the town boundaries. The proposal would restrict the orderly planning of Traralgon and hinder the potential for well planned, sustainable growth of the town.

'Purpose' and 'Decision Guidelines' of the Low Density Residential Zone:

An assessment of the application against the purpose and relevant decision guidelines of the Low Density Residential Zone has been made as follows:

- Council must consider the State Planning Policy Framework and the Local Planning Policy Framework, including the Municipal Strategic Statement and local planning policies. As discussed, it is considered that the proposed subdivision does not accord with these frameworks as the further subdivision of the site into low density residential lots will prejudice the future conventional residential development opportunities of the site and surrounding area. Conventional residential development of the area of Traralgon West is needed in the future to accommodate the future urban growth of Traralgon.
- The protection and enhancement of the natural environment and character of the area must be assessed including the retention of vegetation and faunal habitat and the need to plant vegetation along waterways, gullies, ridgelines and property boundaries.

The West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority (WGCMA) was advised of the application due to the designated waterway located in the southern part of the site. WGCMA objected to the proposal and stated the following in its objection:

"A Designated Waterway has been identified...and requires protection through the creation of a reserve which includes an ecological buffer of 30 metres either side of the designated waterway from the top of bank, or a buffer based on a flood study which identifies the 100 year flood extent, whichever is greater. Such reserves should be vested in Council to ensure the area is maintained sustainably for the long term...

...The Authority does not support the proposed subdivision as the Authority does not believe that multiple landowners can be relied upon to adequately manage the risks and perform the necessary maintenance associated with the long term sustainability of the waterway including the potential to impact on upstream flood levels due to inadequate maintenance.

In light of the above information the Authority objects to the granting of a permit based on, but not limited to, the following:

 The proposed development is not consistent with the objectives of the State Planning Policy Framework, clause 14.02-1 – Catchment Planning and Management: To retain natural drainage corridors with vegetated buffer zones at least 30m wide along each side of the waterway." Given the above response from WGCMA as the authority responsible for the waterway, it is considered that the proposal does not address the protection and enhancement of the natural environment, and therefore this decision guideline has not been satisfied.

WGCMA has advised that it will be attending the VCAT hearing for the application and making a submission in support of its objection to the proposal.

The relevant standards of Clauses 56.07-1 to 56.07-4 of the Latrobe Planning Scheme must be assessed. Clause 56.07 refers to Integrated Water Management of the proposed subdivision. The proposal satisfies Clauses 56.07-1 Drinking Water Supply Objectives regarding the supply of drinking water to the each lot, and Clause 56.07-3 Waste Water Management Objective regarding the disposal of effluent from each lot. Clause 56.07-2 Reused and recycled water objective is not relevant to the application.

Clause 56.07-4 Urban Run-Off Management Objectives refers to the disposal of stormwater from the site. The objectives of this clause are:

- To minimise damage to properties and inconvenience to residents from urban run-off.
- To ensure that the street operates adequately during major storm events and provides for public safety.
- To minimise increases in stormwater run-off and protect the environmental values and physical characteristics of receiving waters from degradation by urban run-off.

A stormwater management plan was requested from the applicant as the increase in impervious areas expected from the subdivision would lead to a substantial increase in the amount of stormwater to be discharged from the site. The applicant has not provided this information. Without this information Council cannot make an informed decision regarding the capability of the site to cope with increased stormwater runoff and the affect this may have on downstream properties. It is therefore concluded that the application does not satisfy this clause.

It is noted that the subdivision satisfies the remaining decision guidelines with regard to the provision of utility services to each lot.

Clause 65 (Decision Guidelines):

Before deciding on an application to subdivide land, the responsible authority must also consider the decision guidelines of Clause 65. In response to the guidelines, the following comments are made:

- The proposal meets the minimum lot size requirements of the Low Density Residential Zone and the building envelopes shown on the plan are each capable of accommodating a dwelling and associated outbuildings. Each lot can be connected to reticulated water, sewerage, electricity and gas. However the issue of stormwater management has not been addressed by the applicant, and downstream properties may be affected by the proposal.
- The land is located in a designated long-term urban growth corridor for Traralgon. Subdivision of the lots into further low density residential lots would restrict the potential for a higher density lot yield from this site in the future.
- Notwithstanding the above, the layout of the proposed subdivision at the rear of the site is considered to be inappropriate as battle-axe allotments are considered to be a poor design outcome. Lots 4 and 5 would have a driveway in excess of 100 metres long with a width of 8 metres which would not facilitate the future subdivision of these lots. Access with these dimensions would not be able to accommodate traffic from increased densities and would therefore preclude the lots from any further subdivision. It would also be a poor outcome for Coopers Road to the north if it was to be constructed in the future as it would have lots backing onto it instead of addressing it.

Objections

The application received two submissions in the form of objections. One was from WGCMA and has been outlined above. The other raised the following issues:

1 The proposal does not comply with Council's Traralgon West Interim Infrastructure Development Policy 2011 (TW Interim Policy).

Comment:

As discussed, the subject site has been identified as being located in the TW Interim Policy area and found not to comply with the policy. It does not comply on the grounds the proposal would compromise future conventional residential development of the area, and would potentially impact on surrounding properties with regard to the disposal of stormwater.

2 Detrimental impacts of potential stormwater flows to downstream properties.

Comment:

The proposal would result in an increase in stormwater from the site. The applicant has not provided a stormwater management plan for the subdivision therefore the impacts of the increased stormwater cannot be assessed at this time.

3 Battleaxe layout of the lots an inappropriate planning outcome for the present and the future.

Comment:

The battleaxe configuration proposed for Lots 4 and 5 would compromise the future development of the lots into conventional residential allotments as the width of the accessway would be inadequate to service an increased number of lots.

4 Fragmentation of future urban layout.

Comment:

The subdivision of the subject site would result in the inability of the land to be further subdivided into conventional residential lots. This is contrary to State and Local Planning Policy Frameworks which discourage further low density residential development on the fringes of major towns where land is designated as a long term urban growth corridor.

5 Designated waterway on site not appropriately treated.

Comment:

The WGCMA has objected to the proposal on the grounds that it does not believe multiple landowners could adequately manage the risks and perform the necessary maintenance associated with the long term sustainability of the waterway.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Additional resources and financial cost will be incurred as the planning permit application requires determination VCAT.

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

INTERNAL / EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

Engagement Method Used:

Notification:

In accordance with the notice requirements of Section 52(1) of the Act, notice was provided to adjoining property owners and occupiers of the proposal and a sign was displayed on the site for 14 days.

External:

In accordance with the referral requirements of Section 55 of the Act, the application was referred to Telstra, SP AusNet Pty Ltd, Gippsland Water and APA Group for consideration. Conditional approval of the subdivision was given by these authorities.

The application was also referred to the West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority (WGCMA) in accordance with Section 52 of the Act.

As discussed, the WGCMA has objected to the proposal.

Internal:

The application was referred internally to Council's Infrastructure Planning team and Rates team.

Council's Infrastructure Planning team requested further information from the applicant prior to making an assessment of the proposal. The referral response stated:

"The resulting increase in the extent of impervious area within the site due to the proposed development will lead to a substantial increase in the amount of stormwater to be discharged from the site. However provisions for the drainage of the land have not been shown on the plans accompanying the application and a stormwater management plan has not been submitted. Although on-site detention can be readily provided for discharges from roof areas, discharges from paved areas are not easily detained.

Before considering this matter any further I therefore require the applicant to prepare and submit a stormwater management plan providing details of how the land including buildings, paved and vehicle access areas are proposed to be drained."

A stormwater management plan was requested from the applicant however this request was declined and a plan was not lodged with Council.

D Tr A

Details of Community Consultation following Notification:

Two objections to the application were received following notification.

A copy of the objections is at Attachment 7.

A planning mediation meeting was not held as the applicant had not submitted the required information to adequately assess the application. The applicant then applied to VCAT for a review of the application. The matter is set down to be heard by VCAT in Melbourne on 20 May, 2013.

AMENDED PLANS

The applicant has lodged 'without prejudice' amended plans in an effort to negotiate a favourable position with Council prior to the VCAT hearing. It is noted that these plans do not, at this time, form part of the planning application. The decision of Council relates to the subdivision plans in Attachment 1 of this report.

The plans show the consolidation of Lots 4 and 5 into one 8,000 square metre lot (Lot 4) and a draft outline development plan for this lot. The draft outline development plan shows a concept for the further subdivision of proposed Lot 4 should the land be rezoned to a denser residential zoning.

A copy of the proposed amended plan is at Attachment 8 and the proposed Future Outline Development Concept Plan is at Attachment 9.

The main points of the amended plans are as follows:

- Lots 1-3 remain as 4,000 square metre lots and are provided with 30 metre building setbacks created by the declared watercourse that runs through the front of the site.
- Lot 4 would be a battle axe allotment of 8,000 square metres.
- The 'Future Outline Development Plan' shows a future road and lot layout. A road would extend north-south along the eastern boundary of the site and would be 8 metres in width. The applicant has suggested that through a section 173 agreement Council could create a road reserve over the 8 metre wide strip on the subject site in conjunction with a similar 8 metre wide strip on the land to the east. It is noted that this land is in separate ownership and would have to be compulsorily acquired.
- Lot 4 could potentially be subdivided into 7 residential allotments in a court arrangement in the future if the zoning changes.

It is considered that the amended plans are not appropriate for the site for the following reasons:

- It is considered to be a poor planning outcome to create roads in an ad hoc manner in the Traralgon West area such as the suggested road along the eastern boundary of the site. An integrated development plan is required for the wider Traralgon West precinct. The proposed layout is therefore considered to be premature based on the fact that such a development plan would be required following the completion of TGAR.
- The constraints of the site with regard to stormwater management have not been addressed and will have a significant impact on the layout of the subdivision.
- The imposition of a future road on an adjoining landowner is considered to be unreasonable.

OPTIONS

As the applicant has lodged an application for review with VCAT, Council cannot formally determine this application. Council can only form a position that it will rely upon at VCAT. Therefore Council has the following options in regard to this application:

- 1. Form the position that the application be refused; or
- 2. Form the position that the application be approved.

Council's decision must be based on planning grounds, having regard to the provisions of the Latrobe Planning Scheme.

Should Council not formally resolve a position on this matter at the meeting of 6 May 2013, officers will present submissions at VCAT in line with the recommendations of this report due to the hearing date being set for 20 May 2013.

CONCLUSION

The proposal is considered to be:

- Inconsistent with Clauses 11.02-1 (Supply of Urban Land) and 21.04-3 (Rural Living Overview) of the Scheme by facilitating an inappropriate low density residential subdivision on land that is designated as a long-term urban growth corridor. The proposal would compromise future development at higher densities and restrict the orderly planning of future growth for Traralgon;
- Inconsistent with the objectives of the State Planning Policy Framework, Clause 14.02-1 – Catchment Planning and Management: To retain natural drainage corridors with vegetated buffer zones at least 30m wide along each side of the waterway;

- Inconsistent with the purpose and decision guidelines of the Clause 32.03 (Low Density Residential Zone) as it fails to satisfy the objectives of Clause 56.07-4 Urban Run-Off Management Objectives for the disposal of stormwater from the site;
- Inconsistent with Council's Traralgon West Interim Infrastructure Development Policy 11 POL-2 which has been considered pursuant to Section 60(1A)(g) of the *Planning and Environment Act* 1987; and
- Inconsistent with Clause 65.02 (Decision Guidelines);

Having evaluated the proposal against the relevant provisions of the Scheme, it is considered that the application does not meet its requirements. It is therefore recommended that Council advise VCAT that had a "Failure to Determine within the Prescribed Time" appeal not been lodged, Council would have issued a Refusal to Grant a Permit for the reasons set out in this report.



- 3 The proposal is inconsistent with the purpose and decision guidelines of the Clause 32.03 (Low Density Residential Zone) as it fails to satisfy the objectives of Clause 56.07-4 Urban Run-Off Management Objectives for the disposal of stormwater from the site;
- 4 The proposal is inconsistent with Council's Traralgon West Interim Infrastructure Development Policy 11 POL-2 which has been considered pursuant to Section 60(1A)(g) of the *Planning and Environment Act* 1987; and
- 5 The proposal is inconsistent with Clause 65.02 (Decision Guidelines).





The Authority does not have any official record of flooding for the property described above on which to base its assessment. Mapping available to the Authority indicates that a designated waterway runs through the property across the proposed Lots 1, 2 & 3: See Figure 1.



The State Planning Policy Framework outlines strategic issues of State importance which must be considered when decisions are made for such development. Specifically Clause 14.02-1 of the Victorian Planning Provisions (Catchment Planning and Management) provides the following strategies that outline how the objective of the policy is to be achieved:

- Consider the impacts of catchment management on downstream water quality and freshwater, coastal and marine environments.
- Retain natural drainage corridors with vegetated buffer zones at least 30m wide along each side of a waterway
 to maintain the natural drainage function, stream habitat and wildlife corridors and landscape values, to minimise
 erosion of stream banks and verges and to reduce polluted surface runoff from adjacent land uses^o
- Undertake measures to minimise the quantity and retard the flow of stormwater runoff from developed areas.
- Encourage measures to filter sediment and wastes from stormwater prior to its discharge into waterways, including the preservation of floodplain or other land for wetlands and retention basins.
- Ensure that works at or near waterways provide for the protection and enhancement of the environmental
 qualities of waterways and their in stream uses.
- Ensure land use and development proposals minimise nutrient contributions to waterways and water bodies and the potential for the development of algal blooms.
- Require the use of appropriate measures to restrict sediment discharges from construction sites.

A Designated Waterways has been identified in Figure 1 and requires protection through the creation of a reserve which includes an ecological buffer of 30 metres either side of the designated waterway from the top of bank, or a buffer based on a flood study which identifies the 100 year flood extent, whichever is the greater. Such reserves should be vested in Council to ensure the area is maintained sustainably for the long term.

Figure 1: Mapping indicating designated waterways and 30 metre buffer zone on either side of the waterways



The Planning Permit Submission report prepared by Beveridge Williams, Sale (Ref: 1200631 July 2012) reported on Page 4 that the designated waterway is now a small linear open drain that acts as an overflow for the pond that was constructed at 15 Bradford Drive. The Authority's mapping indicates that the directional flow of the waterway is east to west and therefore the water flow is into the pond and not the other way around as implied in the report.

In addition to the requirements under Clause 14.02-1 of the Planning Scheme any works within 30m of the waterway will require a Licence from the WGCMA under the Water Act 1989. It is noted that the development proposes culvert crossing works within the waterway corridor which will require separate approval from the Authority.

The Authority does not support the proposed subdivision as the Authority does not believe that multiple landowners can be relied upon to adequately manage the risks and perform the necessary maintenance associated with the long term sustainability of the waterway including the potential to impact on upstream flood levels due to inadequate maintenance.

In light of the above information the Authority objects to the granting of a permit based on, but not limited to, the following:

 The proposed development is not consistent with the objectives of the State Planning Policy Framework, clause 14.02-1 – Catchment Planning and Management: To retain natural drainage corridors with vegetated buffer zones at least 30m wide along each side of a waterway

Having reviewed the documentation available at Council's Traralgon Service Centre, we object to the proposal on the following grounds or have identified the following concerns and deficiencies with the documentation.

- 5 Lot Subdivision Bradford drive Traralgon
- Applicant: M E Vogt
- Application reference no. 2012/184

1 – The proposal does not comply with Council's *Traralgon West Interim Infrastructure Development Policy* 2011.

It is recognised that this document does not form part of the Latrobe Planning Scheme, however we submit it is extremely relevant. The policy provides a sound and orderly approach to subdivisions within this area in the absence of adequate drainage infrastructure. The decision guidelines within this policy require the following to be considered (inter alia):

- The need to prevent the subdivision of land which may compromise future opportunities for future residential development within the precinct.
- Whether the proposal will result in increased stormwater volumes being generated and whether this is likely to have an adverse impact on other property.
- Whether a Stormwater Management Plan has been submitted and that the plan is to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.'

Adequate drainage is required to mitigate any effects of the development by detailing any increased water flows from the site to any downstream properties. It is considered that as per the policy, a stormwater management plan should have been provided with the plan. The proposal does not provide sufficient information on this issue and cannot adequately be considered. Given the limited drainage infrastructure in the area, it is assumed stormwater will be discharged into the designated waterway affecting the site. We have concerns around the potential flows causing a detrimental impact to downstream properties.

2 - The design of the proposed subdivision

There can be no argument that lot layouts are important elements of the design of residential areas and neighbourhoods. In this regard, we understand Council has previously taken issue with the use of battle axe configurations for propose lots. It is submitted that the proposed access arrangement to the Lots is not respectful of the character of the area and is inconsistent with the objectives of Clause 21.08 of the Latrobe Planning Scheme, specifically Council's policies relating to urban design and liveability. Council policy encourages articulation of building facades and street integration to provide for safe and active neighbourhoods. The proposed subdivision fails to address these objectives as the subdivision pattern has little relationship to the streetscape.

The Safer Design Guidelines for Victoria 2005 discourages this type of lot configuration for similar safety and urban design grounds. Clause 21.08 restates a principle of good and orderly planning, another of which is that in subdividing land for residential purposes, each lot needs to be able to sustain development with an appropriate sense of address. The proposal fails this consideration. The proposal does not provide adequate integration for the proposed lots to the street and does not produce an acceptable urban design outcome for any future residents using the lengthy driveways. The Safer Design Guidelines... publication nominates that court bowls should be no longer than 75 metres in length. The proposed driveways are double this distance and therefore do not provide an acceptable outcome. This is a poor planning outcome that will very likely compromise the sense of isolation felt by potential future residents of these lots.

Whilst there are existing battle axe configurations within the precinct, these are few and do not represent the character of the area. Such subdivisions were either approved some time ago or before Council identified this area as a future long term growth opportunity. The battle axe configuration results in a poor planning outcome both in the present and into the future.

3 - Fragmentation of future urban layout

Further, the battle axe configuration prejudices the future orderly development of the area. It is understood through assessment of the *Traralgon West Interim Infrastructure Development Policy* 2011 and Council's draft Traralgon Growth Areas Review that it is Council's intent to deliver a network of local roads in the vicinity as the precinct becomes part of the urban landscape of Traralgon. There is ample policy within Council's Local Planning Policy Framework which recognises that land on Traralgon's west needs to be protected so as not to fragment the future urban development of the precinct. The proposal is clearly inconsistent with these policies. The draft *Traralgon West Structure Plan* identifies the site as future conventional density residential. The proposed subdivision is contrary to this strategy and will interfere with the achievement of these policy objectives. Whilst it is recognized neither of these documents form part of the Planning Scheme it is submitted that read in conjunction with Council's Municipal Strategic Statement, they provide a clear indication of the need for orderly planning of this precinct of which this proposal does not provide.


4 - Designated Waterway

The proposal further fails to provide an appropriate treatment for the designated waterway affecting the site. Planning Policy provides objectives relating to the protection and enhancement of waterways. These natural drainage lines can often be valued community assets, used both as passive open space and functional water sensitive urban design features. The proposal has not had adequate regard to this characteristic of the site and it is an unacceptable outcome that the plan of subdivision does not respond to this. This could be enhanced for passive open space value and used in the broader planning for this area.

A Planning Permit is required for the development of two or more dwellings on a lot within the Residential 1 Zone in accordance with Clause 32.01-4 of the Latrobe Planning Scheme (the Scheme).

A Planning Permit is required for the subdivision of land in the Residential 1 Zone in accordance with Clause 32.01-2 of the Scheme.

PROPOSAL

The application is for the construction of three dwellings on a lot and three lot subdivision within the Residential 1 Zone.

Each of the proposed dwellings are single storey and semi-attached. All units will be accessed by a common driveway and all units will have one secure parking space each.

The proposed units will contain two bedrooms, a bathroom, laundry, an open plan kitchen/meals area and living area addressing the designated private open space areas. Each of the dwellings will be constructed from face brickwork, sycon stria cladding and a colourbond steel roof.

The proposed subdivision will result in each lot encompassing the respective dwelling, private open space areas, separated by boundary walls and proposed fence lines. The proposed common property area will run along the western boundary of the site, encompassing the driveway providing access to each dwelling.

For further details, please refer to *Attachment 1* to view a copy of the proposed plans.

Subject Land:

The subject land is located at the north eastern corner of Tyrone Close, covering an overall area of 844 m² with a 17 metre frontage to Tyrone Close. The lot is of an irregular shape, with a northern boundary of 19 metres, western boundary of 36 metres and eastern boundary of 49 metres. The site is currently vacant, generally flat and predominantly covered in grass.

The site is affected by a Covenant Instrument AG414480B which prohibits any main building to be used other than for residential purposes; any building, structure or fence consisting wholly or partly of second hand materials; any dwelling house with less than fifty per cent (50%) of the external wall area constructed of brick, brick veneer, masonry or stone; and any relocated building. The proposal will not breach the restrictions set out in this instrument.

The location of the subject site in relation to the surrounding neighbourhood can be seen in *Attachment 2* of this report.

Surrounding Land Use:

North:	1 Donegal Avenue, Traralgon. Single dwelling and ancillary outbuildings.
South:	7 Tyrone Close, Traralgon. Single dwelling and ancillary outbuildings.
East:	Road Reserve Hazelwood Road Road Zone – Category 1
West:	5 Tyrone Close, Traralgon. Single dwelling and ancillary outbuildings.

HISTORY OF APPLICATION

The history of the assessment of planning permit application 2013/014 is identified within *Attachment 3.*

The relevant provisions of the Scheme relevant to this application are identified within *Attachment 4*.

<u>ISSUES</u>

ASSESSMENT AGAINST THE RELEVANT PLANNING POLICIES

The proposal has been assessed in accordance with the State Planning Policy Framework (SPPF) and the Local Planning Policy Framework (LPPF), including the Municipal Strategic Statement (MSS). It is considered that the proposal complies with both the SPPF and LPPF which state that planning for urban growth should consider opportunities for the consolidation, redevelopment and intensification of existing urban areas.

This includes increasing housing diversity and affordability. The proposal will add to the range of available housing types to meet increasingly diverse needs, and assist in directing urban growth into Traralgon, which is an important regional centre as identified in the Scheme. The subject site is located within a Residential 1 Zone (R1Z), and the proposal has been assessed against the purpose and decision guidelines of the R1Z. It is reasonable to consider that the subject site is appropriately zoned for residential development.

DESIGN RESPONSE

As part of the planning permit application, detailed site analysis plans and a written design response have been submitted by the applicant to explain how the proposal has been designed to derive from, and respond to the neighbourhood character. Council's Planning Officers are of the view that the design response is appropriate to the neighbourhood and the site, and that the proposal generally respects the existing neighbourhood character of the area as follows:

- The single storey form of the proposed development is not foreign to the subject area, as it is evident that there are dwellings of a similar scale in close proximity to the subject site. A condition is recommended requesting revised plans to provide additional solar access for the dwellings, and the inclusion of eaves for each dwelling to complement the established character of the neighbourhood and improve the energy efficiency of the dwellings.
- The semi-attached design of the three dwellings is not typical of the area; however the level of articulation between the dwellings and implementation of varying roof lines allows for each individual dwelling to be easily identified within the lot and as a result, is not considered to detract from the character of the neighbourhood.
- The building materials chosen for the development, consisting of brick veneer, sycon stria cladding and colourbond roofing, in conjunction with the modern design, will not result in visual bulk and therefore not significantly alter the character of the neighbourhood.

- The location of drainage and sewerage easements on the site has placed some constraints on the full development potential of the site, which has significantly influenced the design of the proposal. The location of the secluded private open spaces areas for the units is considered to be acceptable given the constraints of the subject site and the single storey nature of the dwellings.
- Landscaping plans are considered to be adequate, and provide sufficient amounts of landscaping to improve the appearance of the dwellings, addressing the Tyrone Close frontage.

CLAUSE 55 ASSESSMENT

The proposal has been assessed against Clause 55 of the Scheme and is deemed to satisfy the relevant objectives and standards of the Clause in relation to neighbourhood character, site layout, building massing, amenity impacts, on site amenity, facilities and detailed design of the proposal.

A Clause 56 assessment was not required to be completed as the requirements set out in Clause 55 have been satisfied.

OBJECTIONS

The application received one (1) submission in the form of an objection. A copy of the objection can be viewed at *Attachment 5* of this report. The issues raised were:

1 The land is affected by flooding and the development will affect neighbouring properties

Officer Comment:

Sites that are identified to be affected by flooding by the West Gippsland Catchment Management authority are identified with a *'Land Subject to Inundation Overlay'* or *'Floodway Overlay'* affecting the site. The subject site is not affected by any overlays.

Internal officer comments were sought from Council's Infrastructure Planning team in relation to the drainage component of the proposed development. The Infrastructure Planning team, as part of their assessment, concluded that specific information relating to the levels of discharge and waste water treatment measures will be required to be submitted to and approved by Council. This information will detail how the development will not adversely impact any adjoining property owners, and ensure that any stormwater on the site is appropriately discharged of. This information will be submitted to Council and assessed by the Infrastructure Planning team prior to the commencement of any development.

It must be noted that Hazelwood Road is identified as a Road Zone – Category 1 road, and as a result the maintenance of such roads is the responsibility of the relevant road authority; in this instance being VicRoads. Notwithstanding this information, and having regard to the nature of the objection, it is considered that any drainage issues associated with the proposed development can be adequately be addressed by the enforcement of appropriate stormwater detention and discharge standards.

2 Location of proposed al fresco area for dwelling 3 will be impacted as a result of noise emanating from 1 Donegal Avenue

Officer Comment:

The operation of and noise emitted from power-tools at an adjoining property is not a relevant planning consideration, as it does not form part of the proposal. All residents are required to adhere to the *Environment Protection (Residential Noise) Regulations* 2008 which apply to noise emitted from residential premises and residential premises under construction, and stipulates the specific types of equipment and their prohibited times. In the event a complaint is received, the Environmental Protection Agency will be responsible to ensure that residents comply with the restrictions set out in the above regulations.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Additional resources or financial cost will only be incurred should the planning permit application require determination at the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT).

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

INTERNAL / EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

Engagement Method Used:

Notification:

The application was advertised pursuant to Section 52(1) (a) and Section 52(1) (d) of the Act. Notices were sent to all adjoining and adjacent landowners and occupiers and an A3 notice was displayed on site for 14 days.

One (1) submission in the form of a written objection was received for the application. The issues raised in the objection are discussed in section 5.4 of this report.

External:

The application was referred under Section 55 of the Act to the following authorities:

- Gippsland Water;
- Telstra;
- SP AusNet;
- APA Group

All the above authorities gave consent to the granting of a Planning Permit for the proposal, subject to the inclusion of appropriate conditions and notes (where applicable).

Internal:

Internal officer comments were sought from Council's Infrastructure Planning team in relation to access and drainage. The Infrastructure Planning team did not object to the granting of a Planning Permit in relation to their area of expertise, subject to appropriate conditions if approved.

It is noted that these comments only relate to part of the assessment process and should be considered in conjunction with the assessment details provided elsewhere in this report.

Details of Community Consultation following Notification:

Following the referral and advertising of the application, one submission in the form of an objection was received.

At the request of the applicant, a mediation meeting was not held due to the nature of the issues listed in the objection. As a result, the matter could not be determined by officer delegation, therefore requiring a decision by Council.

OPTIONS

Council has the following options in regard to this application:

- 1 Issue a Notice of Decision to Grant a Planning Permit; or
- 2 Issue a Notice of Refusal to Grant a Planning Permit.

Council's decision must be based on planning grounds, having regard to the provisions of the Latrobe Planning Scheme.

CONCLUSION

The proposal is considered to be:

- Consistent with the strategic direction of the State and Local Planning Policy Frameworks;
- Consistent with the 'Purpose' and 'Decision Guidelines' of the Residential 1 Zone;
- Consistent with the provisions of Clause 55; and
- Consistent with Clause 65 (Decision Guidelines).

The objections received have been considered against the provisions of the Latrobe Planning Scheme. Having evaluated the proposal against the relevant provisions of the Scheme, it is considered that the application meets the requirements of the Scheme, subject to the inclusion of appropriate Planning Permit conditions and notes.

 - b) eaves should also be provided for each dwelling, in appropriate locations to improve the energy efficiency of the dwellings and to complement the development occurring in the neighbourhood.

When approved, the plans will be endorsed and then form part of the permit. The plans must be drawn to scale with dimensions and three copies must be provided. Mandatory Condition:

- 2. The owner of the land must enter into an agreement with:
 - a. a telecommunications network or service provider for the provision of telecommunication services to each lot shown on the endorsed plan in accordance with the provider's requirements and relevant legislation at the time; and
 - b. a suitably qualified person for the provision of fibre ready telecommunication facilities to each lot shown on the endorsed plan in accordance with any industry specifications or any standards set by the Australian Communications and Media Authority, unless the applicant can demonstrate that the land is in an area where the National Broadband Network will not be provided by optical fibre.

Before the issue of a Statement of Compliance for any stage of the subdivision under the Subdivision Act 1988, the owner of the land must provide written confirmation from:

- c. a telecommunications network or service provider that all lots are connected to or are ready for connection to telecommunications services in accordance with the provider's requirements and relevant legislation at the time; and
- d. a suitably qualified person that fibre ready telecommunication facilities have been provided in accordance with any industry specifications or any standards set by the Australian Communications and Media Authority, unless the applicant can demonstrate that the land is in an area where the National Broadband Network will not be provided by optical fibre.
- 3. The development and layout of the subdivision as shown on the endorsed plans must not be altered without the written consent of the Responsible Authority.

- 4. Enter into an agreement with SPI Electricity Pty Ltd for the extension, upgrading or rearrangement of the electricity supply to lots on the plan of subdivision. A payment to cover the cost of such work will be required.
- 5. Provide electricity easements internal and external to the subdivision in favour of SPI Electricity Pty Ltd to service the

lots on the plan of subdivision and/or abutting lands as required by SPI Electricity Pty Ltd. The provision of reserves for electricity substations may also be required.

Telstra Condition:

- 6. The operator of this permit must meet the requirements of Telstra Corporation Ltd in that, prior to the issues of Certification/Statement of Compliance, they:
 - a. That the plan of subdivision submitted for certification be referred to Telstra in accordance with Section 8 of the Subdivision Act 1988.

Gippsland Water Conditions:

- 7. The operator of this permit must meet the requirements of Gippsland Water in that, prior to the issues of Certification/Statement of Compliance, they:
 - a) Pay to Gippsland Water contributions for Headwork charges and Outfall/Disposal charges for the change in development of the land. These charges are based on Gippsland Water's current rates and reflect the additional loading placed on the water and sewerage reticulation systems by this development.
 - b) Provide water and wastewater services to Gippsland Water's minimum supply standards, unless otherwise agreed with by Gippsland Water.
 - c) The existing 20mm water service will need to be capped at the main.
 - d) Install a master water service meter within the common property to the satisfaction of Gippsland Water. As constructed details showing the location of the installed services are required to be submitted to Gippsland Water.
 - e) Install separate slave water service meters for each lot within the common property to all lots to the satisfaction of Gippsland Water. As constructed details showing the location of the installed services are required to be submitted to Gippsland Water.
 - f) Provide Gippsland Water with a copy of the Owners Corporation Schedule.
 - g) The certified plan of subdivision must create easements, under Section 12(2) of the Subdivision Act, over all existing water and sewerage works within the subdivision.
 - h) Create easements for Pipeline or Ancillary Purposes in favour of the Central Gippsland Region Water Corporation

over all existing sewerage works located within the subdivision.

- As constructed details showing the location of the combined internal sewer services for all lots are required to be submitted to Casey Services via facsimile on 98 35 5515 and a copy to Gippsland Water on facsimile 51745174.
- j) Any plan of subdivision of the subject land lodged for certification shall be referred to Gippsland Water under Section 8(1) of the Subdivision Act 1988.

Engineering Conditions:

- 8. Prior to the certification of the plan of subdivision under the Subdivision Act 1988 or the commencement of development (whichever is sooner), a site drainage plan including all hydraulic computations must be submitted to and approved by the Responsible Authority. When approved, the plan will be endorsed and will then form part of the permit. The drainage plan must be prepared in accordance with the requirements of Latrobe City Council's Design Guidelines and must provide for the following:
 - b. How the land including all buildings, open space and paved areas will be drained for a 1 in 5 year ARI storm event.
 - c. An underground pipe drainage system conveying stormwater to the legal point of discharge.
 - d. The provision of storm water detention within the site and prior to the point of discharge into the Council drainage system if the total rate of stormwater discharge from the property exceeds the rate of discharge that would result if a co-efficient of run-off of 0.45 was applied to the whole of the property area.
- 9. The plan of subdivision submitted for certification under the Subdivision Act 1988 must show appropriate easements set aside for drainage purposes to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 10. Prior to the issue of a Statement of Compliance for this subdivision under the Subdivision Act 1988, the operator of this permit must complete the following works to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority:
 - a) All drainage works must be constructed in accordance with the approved site drainage plan.

- b) The construction of all on-site stormwater detention works in accordance with the site drainage plan approved by the Responsible Authority.
- c) Construct a new vehicle crossing in accordance with the endorsed plans, at right angles to the road and must comply with the vehicle crossing standards set out in Latrobe City Council's Standard Drawing LCC 307.
- d) The areas shown on the endorsed plans for vehicle access within the property must be constructed in accordance with the endorsed plans and be surfaced with concrete, reinforced concrete, brick paving or hot mix asphalt and drained in accordance with the approved site drainage plan.
- 11. Appropriate measures must be implemented throughout the construction stage of the development to rectify and/or minimise mud, crushed rock or other debris being carried onto public roads or footpaths from the subject land, to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 12. No vehicle parking shall be permitted to occur in front of the garages of proposed dwellings 2 and 3.

Landscaping Conditions:

- 13. Prior to the occupancy of the development or by such later date as is approved by the Responsible Authority in writing, the landscaping works shown on the endorsed plans must be carried out and completed to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 14. The landscaping shown on the endorsed plans must be maintained to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority, including that any dead, diseased or damaged plants are to be replaced.

General Conditions:

- 15. The exterior colour and cladding of the buildings must be of a non-reflective nature to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 16. Upon completion of the works, the site must be cleared of all excess and unused building materials and debris to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 17. Once building works have commenced they must be completed to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.

Expiry of Permit:

- 18. This permit will expire if one of the following circumstances applies:
 - a) the development is not started within two years of the date of this permit; or
 - b) the development is not completed within four years of the date of this permit; or
 - c) the plan of subdivision is not certified within 2 years of the date of this permit; or
 - d) the registration of the subdivision is not completed within 5 years of certification.

The Responsible Authority may extend the periods referred to if a request is made in writing before the permit expires, or within three months afterwards.

Note: The commencement of the subdivision is regarded by Section 68(3A) of the *Planning and Environment Act* 1987 as the certification of the plan, and completion is regarded as the registration of the plan.



"A Council may, in addition to any power given to it by Sections 43 and 44 of the *Planning and Environment Act* 1987-

- (i) discontinue a road, or part of a road, by a notice in the Victoria Government Gazette; and
- (ii) sell the land from that road (if it is not Crown Land), transfer the land to the Crown or itself or retain the land."

Both of these powers are subject to Section 223 of the Local Government Act 1989 which requires Council "publish a public notice stating that submissions in respect of the matter specified in the public notice will be considered in accordance with this section."

Council must then consider any written submissions that have been received and any person who has made a submission and requested they be heard are entitled to appear before a meeting of Council.

BACKGROUND

On 17 December 2012, Council resolved to undertake a full review of the Moe Activity Centre Plan (MACP) and the Moe Rail Precinct Revitalisation Project (MRPRP).

Having considered this review at a Special Council Meeting held on 25 March 2013 Council resolved the following;

- That Council note the review of the Moe Activity Centre Plan and Moe Rail Precinct Revitalisation Project has been completed in accordance with the Council resolutions of 17 December 2012, 4 February 2013, 18 February 2013, 20 February 2013 and 18 March 2013.
- 2. That Council pursue state and federal government funding opportunities to progress the Moe Rail Precinct Revitalisation Project as per the Concept Design adopted on 9 May 2011.
- 3. That the head petitioners of the two petitions received during the review be advised of Council's decision in relation to their petitions requesting that the Moe Rail Precinct Revitalisation Project Master Plan be implemented immediately and that Council actively seek funding from both state and federal governments to ensure the completion of the project in a timely manner.
- 4. That the Mayor write to all submitters thanking them for their submissions and advising them of the completion of the review.

In September 2008 Council had previously resolved to acquire the properties at 1 to 29 George Street, Moe, to enable redevelopment of the land as a civic precinct. This was finalised in October 2011 and the buildings were subsequently demolished with the attached plan of consolidation (PC 362808R) currently being lodged at Land Victoria.

As identified in the recent review, the parcel of land subject to the Moe Rail Precinct Revitalisation Project Master Plan is comprised of the land already acquired by Council, land parallel to the railway line owned by VicTrack and an unnamed road reserve which belongs to the Crown.

This unnamed Government road reserve, identified as Crown Allotment 23Q in the Parish of Moe, originally provided access from George Street and is unconstructed with an approximate area of 700 square metres.

The proposed civic and community hub building that is to be included as part of the project would be constructed across each of these parcels of land and, whilst it is not inherently necessary for Council to own the land, it will be necessary for the road to be discontinued to remove the road status.

The Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE) have previously advised that they can undertake this road discontinuance under the *Land Act* 1958 or, alternatively, Council can discontinue the road under the *Local Government Act* 1989.

In either case, once the road has been discontinued the land will vest in the Crown and Council would need to make application to the DSE to have it transferred pursuant to Section 99 of the *Land Act* 1958.

This section of the Act allows the Minister to "sell Crown land to a public authority at a price and on terms and conditions which the Minister thinks fit, if the Minister is satisfied that the public authority requires the land for a public purpose".

ISSUES

The DSE are unable to transfer the land to Council until the road reserve has been formally discontinued which, as stated above, can be undertaken by either party.

The land sale process that is undertaken by the DSE can be quite lengthy and sales such as this are generally not of a high priority. Indications have been given that, due to the significance of the project, it can be given priority though it is still likely that the transfer will take at least a year to finalise.

It will therefore save time for Council to undertake the discontinuance of the road reserve pursuant to the *Local Government Act* 1989. A copy of the gazettal notice and a survey plan, based upon work currently being undertaken by Beveridge Williams, can be provided to the DSE as part of the application to acquire the land.

Once title to the land, in the form of a Crown Grant, has been received from Land Victoria it will be necessary for it to be consolidated with the land already acquired by Council and any additional land that is to be acquired from VicTrack.

At this point no formal discussions have been undertaken with the DSE in relation to the future transfer and separate negotiations are currently being undertaken with VicTrack to facilitate the transfer of the additional land that is required.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

As this is a statutory process with the aim of facilitating transfer of the land to Council there is unlikely to be any associated risks with the proposed discontinuance of the road reserve.

Costs associated with undertaking the statutory process are minimal, being the cost of public notices in the Latrobe Valley Express inviting submissions and, should Council resolve to discontinue the road, an order published in the Victoria Government Gazette.

The sale price for the land will be determined by a valuation obtained by the Department of Sustainability and Environment and this will also include government fees that will be payable by Council.

As stated above, Section 99 of the *Land Act* 1958 allows the Minister to transfer the land to a public body at a price that is considered appropriate and this could allow Council to negotiate an outcome based upon the land being part of a greater project.

All costs associated with the acquisition of the land will be accommodated within existing budget allocations for the project.

INTERNAL/EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

Engagement Method Used:

Public comment on the proposed road discontinuance will be sought via the following methods:

- Public notices placed in the Latrobe Valley Express
- Notice placed on-site
- Notice displayed at the Moe Service Centre and Corporate Headquarters
- Details placed on the Latrobe City Council website

Details of Community Consultation / Results of Engagement:

In accordance with Section 223 of the *Local Government Act* 1989 any submissions that are received regarding this matter will be referred for consideration at a future Council meeting.

OPTIONS

Council may now resolve to either:

- Commence the statutory process to discontinue this road reserve pursuant to Section 206 and Schedule 10 Clause 3 of the *Local Government Act* 1989
- Make application to the Department of Sustainability and Environment to acquire the land pursuant to Section 99 of the *Land Act* 1958 and allow them to undertake the road closure as part of their sale process.

CONCLUSION

The discontinuance of the unnamed Government road reserve identified as Crown Allotment 23Q in the Parish of Moe is necessary to enable the land to be transferred to Council as part of the Moe Activity Centre Plan and Moe Rail Precinct Revitalisation Project.

It would therefore be reasonable for Council to commence the statutory process to discontinue this road reserve by giving public notice of the proposal and inviting public comment.





BACKGROUND

Annually, as part of the budget preparation process, Council reviews user fees and charges. In order to incorporate any proposed changes to the fees and charges into the 2013/14 budget from 1 July 2013, the adoption of the fees and charges is required ahead of the adoption of the budget.

<u>ISSUES</u>

The proposed draft Fees & Charges have been prepared on the basis of CPI increases and/or benchmark market rates and/or Victorian Government and statutory charges.

A significant number of Council's fees and charges require notice to be given to users. This notice can vary from one to two months depending upon the service. Undertaking community consultation in May followed by adoption in June 2013, allows the required notice to be given for any changes to fees and charges in adequate time for implementation from 1 July 2013.

In order to incorporate any proposed changes to the fees and charges into the 2013/14 budget from 1 July 2013, the adoption of the fees and charges is required earlier than the adoption of the budget.

FINANCIAL, RISK AND RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS

Risk has been considered as part of this report and it is considered to be consistent with the Risk Management Plan 2011-2014.

Fees and charges contribute significantly to Council's revenue. In 2013/2014 it is anticipated that fees and charges will provide approximately 14% of Council's annual revenue. The consideration, community consultation and adoption of the proposed fees and charges prior to the finalisation of the budget will provide certainty in relation to this revenue component.

INTERNAL/EXTERNAL CONSULTATION

Engagement Method:

The proposed fees and charges for 2013/14 will be advertised in accordance with Council's Community Engagement Plan 2010-2014. This will include displaying of the fees and charges at Council's Service Centres, Leisure Centres, stadiums and libraries, placing them on Council's website and consulting with service users.

OPTIONS

Council has the following options for consideration:

- 1. Release the proposed fees and charges schedule to the community in order to receive feedback and provide adequate notice to the community of any changes to fees and charges to come into effect on 1 July 2013; or
- 2. Defer the release of the proposed fees and charges schedule to the community, and incorporate the fees and charges schedule and the budget into a single consultation process. The implication of this option is a delay in the introduction of the revised fees and charges resulting in a reduction in revenue.

The 2013 / 2014 fees and charges have been developed within the following parameters:

- Unless otherwise stated in the document, the following measures have been used to determine the 2013 / 2014 fees and charges:
- o Consumer Price Index (CPI) (with a rounding factor)
- o Competitive market influences
- o The % increase in the previous financial year
- o The type of service

PROPOSED 2013 / 2014 FEES AND CHARGES COMMENTARY BY DIVISION / SERVICE

COMMUNITY LIVEABILITY (Pages 11 - 22)

Direct Care (Pages 11 - 12)

Direct care services, include home care, meals on wheels, home maintenance, planned activity group and senior citizen centres. These services derive a significant component of their funding from the state government, with the balance being made up of fees set by Council and a contribution from rates revenue.

The fees charged for these services takes into account the CPI increase, any changes to government funding arrangements and the overall affordability of these services to eligible clients. Consideration has also been given to the level of fee increase over the past five years.

Meals on Wheels - The increase in subsidised and full cost meals is reflective of the increase in meal costs.

Planned Activity Group - Fees have been increased to reflect actual cost of programs. All programs include a meal.

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FEES AND CHARGES 2013 / 2014

Health Services (Pages 13 - 15)

The proposed fees take into account the CPI increase and level of fees increases over past years and changes to the relevant Acts. Vaccines prices are kept in line with purchase prices.

Public Libraries (Pages 16 - 17)

Core library services are provided at no cost to the community. A small amount of revenue is derived from ancillary services based on cost recovery.

Minor increases proposed for photocopying and facsimile to keep fees comparable with other providers.

Increase proposed for library fines which were last increased in 2009/10.

Childrens Services (Pages 18 - 19)

Family Day Care fees are set in conjunctions with the contract providers and incorporate consideration of benchmarking results and actual increased costs associated with providing the service.

The Early Learning and Care Services have been reviewed in terms of proposed fees based on industry benchmarking information taking into consideration National Competition Policy requirements.

Local Laws (Pages 20 - 22)

Parking and animal fees and other local laws permit fees have been reviewed taking into account CPI, benchmarking with other Councils and updated prescribed fees.

RECREATION, CULTURE & COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE (Pages 23 - 41)

Latrobe Regional Gallery (Page 23)

All fees have generally been reviewed in line with CPI.

Performing Arts and Community Halls (Page 24)

All fees have generally been reviewed in line with CPI.

Sports Stadiums, Grounds and Reserves (Pages 30 - 31)

All fees have generally been reviewed in line with CPI. Figures based on a return of 10% of annual maintenance costs for senior clubs and 6% for junior clubs.

Indoor Sports Centres & Aquatics (Pools) (Pages 32 - 36)

A full review of all fees and charges was undertaken with consideration given to benchmarking against neighbouring Councils, changes in operational costs and community and business needs.

A survey of local swimming clubs was undertaken to gauge opinions on the current service and fees which resulted in changes to fees relating to carnival hire. Feedback from Latrobe Leisure members in relation to membership structure was also received which has resulted in changes to the membership structure to provide more flexibility for members. This was undertaken in consultation members and customers with 93% of respondents being in favour of the new membership structure.

Hazelwood Traffic School (Page 37)

All fees have generally been reviewed in line with CPI.

Hire of Portable Toilet Module (Page 37)

All fees have generally been reviewed in line with CPI.

Caravan Parks (Page 38)

All fees have generally been reviewed in line with CPI.

Asset Protection (Pages 39 - 41)

Non statutory fees have been reviewed taking into consideration increased costs to Council and CPI.

Assembly of Councillors Record Explanation / Guide Notes Required pursuant to the Local Government Act 1989 as amended.

1. Section 80A requirements (re: Written Record to be made by Council staff member):

Amendments to the Local Government Act 1989 (Section 80A), operative from 2 December 2008 now stipulate:

"At an assembly of Councillors, the Chief Executive Officer must ensure that a written record is kept of:

- the names of all Councillors and members of Council staff attending;
- the matters considered;
- any conflict of interest disclosures made by a Councillor attending under subsection (3);
- whether a Councillor who has disclosed a conflict of interest as required by subsection (3) leaves the assembly."

The above required information is:

- to be reported to an Ordinary meeting of the Council; and
- incorporated in the minutes of that Ordinary meeting.

2. Section 76AA definition:

"Assembly of Councillors (however titled, e.g: meeting / inspection / consultation etc) is a meeting of an advisory committee of the Council, if at least one Councillor is present, or a planned or scheduled meeting of at least half of the Councillors and one member of staff which considers matters that are intended or likely to be;

- The subject of a decision of the Council; or
- Subject to the exercise of a function, duty or power of the Council that has been delegated to a person or committee.

Brief Explanation:

Some examples of an Assembly of Councillors will include:

- Councillor Briefings;
- on site inspections, generally meetings re: any matters;
- meetings with residents, developers, other clients of Council, consultations;

- meetings with local organisations, Government Departments, statutory authorities (e.g. VicRoads, etc); providing at least 5 Councillors and 1 Council staff member are present and the matter/s considered are intended or likely to be subject of a future decision by the Council OR an officer decision under delegated authority. Effectively it is probable, that any meeting of at least 5 Councillors and 1 Council staff member will come under the new requirements as the assembly will in most cases be considering a matter which will come before Council or be the

subject of a delegated officer's decision at some later time. If you require further clarification, please call the Manager Council Operations – Legal Counsel.

Please note: an Advisory Committee meeting requires only one Councillor to be in attendance. An advisory committee is defined as any committee established by the Council, other than a special committee, that provides advice to:

- the Council; or
- a special committee; or
- a member of Council staff who has been delegated a power, duty or function of the Council under section 98.

3. Section 80A and 80B requirements (re: Conflict of Interest):

Councillors and officers attending an Assembly of Councillors must disclose any conflict of interest. **Section 80A(3)**

"If a Councillor attending an Assembly of Councillors knows, or would reasonably be expected to know, that a matter being considered by the assembly is a matter that, were the matter to be considered and decided by Council, the Councillor would have to disclose a conflict of interest under section 79, the Councillor must disclose either:

- (a) immediately before the matter in relation to the conflict is considered; or
- (b) if the Councillor realises that he/she has a conflict of interest after consideration of the matter has begun, as soon as the Councillor becomes aware of the conflict of interest, leave the assembly whilst the matter is being considered by the assembly."

Section 80B

A member of Council staff who has a conflict of interest (direct or indirect) in a matter in which they have a delegated power, duty or function must:

- not exercise the power or discharge the duty or function;
- disclose the type of interest and nature of interest to the in writing to the Chief Executive Officer as soon as he/she becomes aware of the conflict of interest. In the instance of the Chief Executive Officer having a pecuniary interest, disclosure in writing shall be made to the Mayor.
